**MRS. VERA MACPHAIL**

In the passing of Mrs. Vera (Pound) MacPhail, at the early age of 27, a wide circle of friends sustained a great loss. Mrs. MacPhail was a young woman of kindly personality and much charm of manner, greatly beloved by all who had the privilege of her acquaintance. She was the eldest daughter of Isaac C. Pound, formerly of the office staff of the C. N. R. in Charlottetown, but now of Halifax, N. S. Her mother passed away some years ago.

Mrs. MacPhail had been for many years a consistent and valued member of the Baptist Church of Charlottetown, and was for some time an efficient and popular teacher of the Baptist Sunday School.

She was united in marriage on May 31, 1929, to Mr. Bruce MacPhail of the staff of the P. E. I. Grass Seed Growers' Association. Her early death occurred after a brief illness, on December 11, 1930, the funeral taking place from the residence of Mrs. Robert Pound to the People's Cemetery, the officiating clergyman being her pastor, Dr. A. The late Mr. Pratt was born at Pownal, April 21st 1853, and lived continuously there until 1927 when he moved to Charlottetown. The pleasures that otherwise would have been his to enjoy, in the evening of his days, after a long useful life, was in a sense denied him. Becoming totally blind in the year 1920 he was forced to sell his homestead farm at Pownal though he continued his residence in that village until 1927. He bore his great affliction with characteristic fortitude never doubting but that one day all darkness would be turned to light in the home of his Master, the Great Physician.

He is survived by his widow Caroline McLeod, also one brother in Vancouver, W. A. Pratt, one son Albert of Hathorne, and six daughters, Mrs. Norman Mortimer, Mrs. Milford McPherson, Mrs. E. C. Sayles and Mrs. T. H. Judson all of Brighton, Mass., Mrs. May McNeill of New York and Miss Anna of Charlottetown. Mrs. Mortimer and Mrs. McPherson came from Brighton to attend the funeral on Dec. 4th from 276 Grafton St. Rev. Dr. Ramsay officiating. The pallbearers were William Drake, W. E. Smith, William Ings, George Carver, Arthur Jenkins, and Samuel Jenkins' his respected friends and neighbours of his native Pownal. His body was interred in the family plot in Pownal Cemetery beside the United (former Methodist) Church of which he was a life long member. Rev. H. E. Campbell officiated at the grave.
