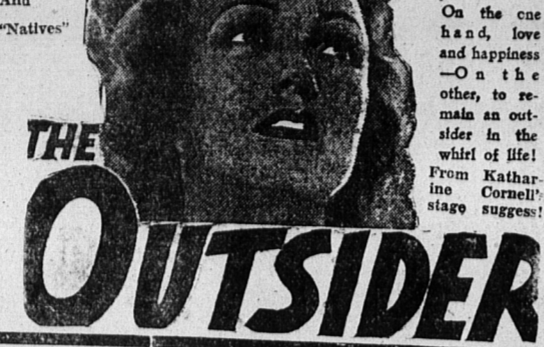

IN MEMORIAN

THE LATE JOHN R. MACDONALD

This month one of the most revered and most beloved citizens of Vernon River ended his earthly pilgrimage, and began that celestial journey which is the reward of faithful service. The late John R. MacDonald was one of the last survivors of the well known MacDonald "Doctors" who came to Prince Edward Island in 1772 and who are now represented here only by children of the third generation.

During the ninety one years of his life, all of which he spent in his native parish, Johnny Doctor, as he was familiarly known to his friends, was a model of industry, and the home he founded when he married Annie MacIsaac, whose death preceded his by nine years, was a fine example of that highland hospitality which he inherited from his ancestors, and which he and his much beloved spouse enhanced by their own generous dispositions and pleasant personalities.

Those who have had the pleasure of a visit to this home carry to this day pleasant memories of the happy hours spent around his fireside, where brilliant conversation and forceful but unbiased opinion joined with sparkling wit to enlighten and entertain the voyager, regardless of whether he was familiar friend or stranded stranger.

Of the family to which he belonged none now remains. Of his own family two, a son Joseph R. and a daughter, Eunice, Mrs. John J. MacDonald, have predeceased their father. Surviving are three daughters, Mary T. of Marango, Sask.; Cecilia, Mrs. D. J. MacKenzie of Ottawa; and Mildred, Mrs. Daniel Fraser of Sintulata, Sask.; and two sons, Leo of Melville, Sask.; and Andrew at home.

One granddaughter, Marie, also resides at home. The deceased enjoyed rugged health all the days of his life, exhibiting a virility and endurance, even of late years, that was remarkable. Only a few years ago he visited unaccompanied his children in Ottawa and in the West, and the acuteness of his mind and the lucidity of his memory were well demonstrated by the extraordinary ability he showed in relating the most minute details of his visit. His calm judgment and keen wit were noticeable even in the last days of his illness, and he remained conscious, conversing with friends and relatives, until his last breath.

Fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church he went to meet his Judge on Wednesday, July 19, leaving those who survive him an example of an active citizen, a generous neighbor and a kind and loving father.

Requiem High Mass was celebrated in St. Joachim's Church, Vernon River, on Friday morning, Rev. K. O. MacPherson, a nephew of the deceased, officiating, assisted by the Pastor Rev. P. D. McCulligan. The large crowd of friends present at the service was a fitting testimonial of the esteem with which he was held by all his acquaintances.

At the cemetery Father MacPherson read the prayers for the dead, and as the choir chanted the last verses of the "Libera" the last remains of John R. MacDonald were laid to rest beside those of his loving wife.

The pallbearers were, Daniel MacPherson, J. MacDonald, William Masters, Osbert Emman, Charles MacKenzie and Allan Fraser.

On the occasion of the Sesquicentennial observance of the arrival of United States Empire Loyalists in Fredericton, the Capital of New Brunswick, October 8th, it is hoped to unveil a cairn with inscribed tablet, in honor of those Loyalists, the first English settlers in the community. The cairn will be erected close to the little Salamancea Cemetery where many of the pioneers are buried, and a cross will be placed in the Cemetery itself. A nucleus committee has been at work on the project, and a public meeting will be called in the near future, to arouse enthusiasm and co-operation of Fredericton people generally. It is anticipated, too, that much interest will be shown by former Fredericton residents. Rev. Dr. F. A. Wightman is convener, and Sterling Brammen, is Secretary-Treasurer, of the Cairn Committee.

Mr. H. H. Brown, a former prominent resident of this city, who conducted a business here and who left for the Canadian West twenty years ago, is being welcomed by his numerous friends on return to the Island. UNFAIR SOVIET COMPETITION

(LONDON, July 29—(C.P. Cable))—Objection taken by A. V. Ozersky of the Russian delegation at the World Economic Conference to charges made by Hon. E.N. Rhodes, Canadian Minister of Finance, that Russian timber competed unfairly on the world market, resulted in the issuing of a statement today by the Canadian delegation at the Conference.

The Canadian statement today, while stating the delegation considers it neither necessary nor desirable to pursue a discussion involving a comparative review of the methods and practices underlying production under the respective systems of government, says it is necessary to challenge the correctness of a number of the Soviet delegate's statements.

SOVIET STATEMENT

Referring to the Soviet declaration that in the Soviet state "there are no such costs of production as unnecessary advertising, watered stock nor unproductive expenditure in the shape of excessive directors' fees, etc." The Canadian delegation replied that none of these items entered into the cost of production of Canadian timber nor under the pressure of present competition could they be said to exist in any of the great timber producing countries.

THE PLAIN FACT

"The plain fact is Russian timber is controlled by the state and can therefore be sold for what it will fetch." The Canadian statement says. "Secondly, it is produced either by forced labor or by labor working on a standard much below that of other timber producing countries. Thirdly, the timber is sold not by an orderly process of marketing but with a view to disposing of huge quantities at whatever price is necessary to effect bulk sales. Only these conditions could make possible the operation

of the so-called "fall" clause under which the Soviet has undertaken to sell its timber at lower prices than its competitors whatever those prices may be.
