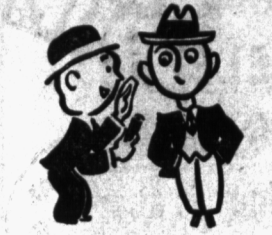

Truro Fathers May Not Smoke

(Canadian Press) TRURO, N. S., Feb. 18.—Smoking at a town council meeting does not look dignified and I suggest that we refrain from it, stated Mayor John Blackford in his inaugural remarks before the 1934 Truro Council. And so the ban was put on Lady Nicotine who for years has been part and parcel of civic celebrations. The new council was thus cheated out of showing what it could do by way of quaffing tobacco smoke while transacting civic business. The retiring council did its work to the accompaniment of two pipes, a cigar and seven cigarettes. All the members of the council but the oldest and youngest enjoyed the weed while engaged in their deliberative work. The new Mayor loves his pipe but gives the preference to dignity when it comes to presiding over the council.

Washington Singer Dead in England

TORQUAY, England, Feb. 18.—Washington Singer, an American who inherited a fortune from the sale of sewing machines, and a well-known owner of racehorses, died here today. He was 83. He was one of the children of Isaac Merritt Singer, founder of the modern sewing machine industry. He was born in Yonkers, N.Y., but was naturalized as a British subject in 1902. His failure to raise a Derby winner may go down in English sports history with Sir Thomas Lipton's quest of the America's Cup. In the 1928 Derby, his horse, Orwell, was such a heavy favorite that the odds were down to two to one, one of the lowest prices on record at Epsom. As Singer lay ill at Torquay, he heard that Orwell, winner of the 2,000 Guineas a month before, finished ninth in the field of 18. Singer virtually retired from racing a month later. His Chalcabon won the St. Leger in 1905 and then collapsed a week before the Derby.
