

Abbies Defeat Saints 8-6 In Intermediate League Rugby Opener

In a wide-open passing game that saw several long broken field runs being pulled off, Jim McCollum's Abbies Saturday afternoon won the opening game of the 15-intermediate league when they defeated Second Saint Dunstan's 8-6 in a close, ruggedly-fought contest.

Hitting for the first try of the game in the first eleven minutes, the Abbies were set back on their heels in the closing stages of the half when Saints galloped over for two unconverted tries on smart back-field passing plays to lead 6-3; but the winners struck in the first five minutes of the second half to push over a try that knotted the score and then converted the score for the points that gave them their victory.

Saints, kicking off with a high wind at their backs took the play right to the Abbies fifteen yard stripe but the ball was dribbled out of danger and on an exchange of passing plays the ball remained in the Saints' zone. Abbies' scrum was controlling the ball at this stage and Younger pulled off the first long run when he raced to the Saints' fifteen. Saints attempted to kick out of danger saw Dodo Martin gather the oval in, race a few steps before passing to LePage; the latter after going 30 yards was hemmed in but on a reverse play snapped the ball over to Mike Hennessey who went over the line in the far corner of the field. The attempt at convert was low and wide.

Saints carried to the Abbies' twenty five after the kickoff but LePage brought the crowd to its feet as he reeled off a 70-yard broken field run that took him to the five-yard line only to have his pass fumbled and the chance for a try ruined.

With play waging back and forth Johnny Cash gave the Saints supporters plenty to cheer about when he went forty yards down the sideline, tossed out of bounds he managed to get a pass away and with a couple of more passes thrown in as the play swung to the other side of the field Gerard McInnis plunged over from five yards out to make it 3-all. Pressing harder than ever after

the score Saints overcame a couple of bad fumbles of their own to again carry to within striking distance. Cash was again carrying the ball as he came through with a broken field run of 30 yards that took him to the 10-yard line; as he heeled cleanly Shorty McKinnon scooped up the oval to go over standing up and give the University team a 6-3 lead as the convert attempt was again low.

In the last five minutes Abbies again started to press and were within five yards of the tying counter but a penalty kick to the Saints brought them over out of danger and ruined the final scoring chance of the session.

After hurling the Saints back in the opening couple of minutes of the second half Abbies' smart passing attacks again crept into the picture. On the first attack they carried to the 35-yard marker and on the next one struck payoff dirt as Lloyd Archer, pick-off a loose ball tossed the oval to Abbies' kicking star, Art Perry and the latter after going 15 yards heaved the ball over to Moe Goodwin and Goodwin, who had played a driving game all afternoon made the remaining distance to the line. Windy LePage, the big ball carrying threat of the winners kicked the extra points to give the City team their victory.

Rather than tiring as was expected of them Abbies kept hammering away at the Saints for the remainder of the game; the Saints' scrum were controlling the ball but fast following Abbies forwards gave ball carriers little chance to get started. As a result Abbies had slight advantage in territory play for the final 30 minutes of hard fought ball.

Canadiens Take Two Games Over Week-end, Defeating Detroit, Boston

(By The Canadian Press)

DETROIT, Oct. 26—Defenceman Glen Harmon, playing in an unaccustomed position at left wing for Montreal Canadiens, hammered in two long shots in the second period tonight as Montreal won a 4-2 National Hockey League decision over the Detroit Red Wings before 14,323 fans.

It was a costly victory for the Canadiens, who lost Murph Chamberlain with a painful leg injury in the first period, but Harmon plugged Chamberlain's vacated forward position with rousing effectiveness.

Both Harmon's goals which came less than two minutes apart in the second period, resulted from lax defensive play on the part of the Red Wings to bring the Canadiens' defence to claim a share of the league lead with the Boston Bruins, who beat Chicago tonight.

Maurice (The Rocket) Richard, who counted Montreal's first goal nine minutes after the game started, also scored his club's last one with just 21 seconds of play left, battling in an unassisted corner when the puck caromed to him off Red Wing sled Abel.

Red-haired Jimmy Conacher scored both the Detroit goals in the penalty box.

Roger Leger was in the box for interference when Jimmy showed a rebound shot through Bill Durman's outstretched legs with 2 1-2 minutes left in the opening period, and Emile (Butch) Bouchard was serving time for tripping when Conacher punched a simple shot into the corner of the net midway through the second period, after Gordon Howe's pass had set him up.

One thing the game clearly showed was that the City is still capable of producing a rugby squad. There was no little amount of misgivings when the team was first mooted; those same misgivings have been cleared up now and if Coach McCallum can keep this same pack of fairly young players together another season they should be about ready to re-enter senior competition.

Judging by Saturday night performances it looks as if both Toronto Maple Leafs and Montreal Canadiens have struck their scoring stride at last and from here to the finish, barring injuries to the two Canadian entrants in the National Hockey League should be causing puck nightmares for rival goal-tenders.

In Toronto, judging by the accounts over the ether waves, there was apparently no stopping the Leafs' line once they poked in that winning counter early in the second period. From that point on they kept on clipping the wings of the luckless Black Hawks and the result was never in doubt in the closing stages.

Canadiens hammered Boston Bruins 5-0 and that one must have sent rabid Montreal fans into a frenzy. They too must have been packing all their vaulted scoring power. But, outside of that, Bill Durman's shutout must have set at rest the uneasiness that has been felt over the Vezina Trophy holder's sore knee. That same knee has been a matter of concern ever since the season opened but there couldn't have been much wrong with it Saturday when he blanked the hard-shooting Boston Bruins squad.

It was Stymie's second straight victory in the Gallant Fox. Saturday he set the mile-and-five-furlong track record at 2:42 4-5. Saturday the son of Equestrian was clocked in 2:44 2-5.

Stymie, now well ahead of Armageddon's \$781,500 earnings, had failed to win in his last four starts since Sept. 1. In fact he had been beaten badly by 12 lengths in his last two outings.

Bruins Come From Behind To Defeat Chicago

BOSTON, Oct. 26—(AP)—Boston Bruins, thanks to Joe Carveth's third-period goal, gained a 3-2 win over Chicago Black Hawks tonight before a crowd of 13,900 fans at Boston Garden. It was the fourth straight National Hockey League setback for the visitors.

Bruins led for only a little while in their next six games on the road, had to come from behind twice to gain their third triumph in their four league starts.

Doug Bentley converted a pass from his brother Max late in the first period for the first Chicago score and they reversed their roles early in the second period to give the Black Hawks a 2-1 lead.

But Chicago skaters managed to score late in the second period more than a minute, until rookie centre Eddie Sandford, who was playing junior hockey with Toronto's St. Michael's College sextet last season, rapped in his first net on Oct. 26.

The 19-year-old Sandford was assisted by winger Ed Harrison, who also jumped in to the major ice circuit from St. Michael's.

Little Kenny Smith scored the first Boston goal with only four seconds left in the first period, while Ralph Natrass, of the Chicago secondaries, was serving a minor penalty.

Carveth managed to get a piece of his stick on a high pass Clare Martin fired from the blue line—just enough of it—to deflect the game-winner into the open side of goalie Emile Francis' cage from about 10 feet out.

Suggest Fund To Feed Athletes At Olympic Games

(By The Associated Press)

LONDON, Oct. 26—A group of American business men and sportsmen have suggested raising \$50,000 (\$200,000 for extra food) to be distributed to Olympic athletes in London next year, the Sunday Pictorial reported today.

Sports columnist Peter Wilson wrote that athletes of such countries as Sweden and Switzerland "who are thought to be well off for food" will be barred from participating in the American gift.

It has been suggested, Wilson said, that live, healthy, sheep and chickens should be brought over to England and placed on an available farm in Hampshire. It is not yet known, Wilson said, whether the Ministry of Agriculture will permit this move.

Extra rations a month or more before the games, which begin July 30 next year, would make all the differences to British and European athletes, would make competition much more acute, and is in the best tradition of the classic Olympics, Wilson said.
