### KING CONSTANTINE LOST HIS TENTH RIB.

LONDON, Jan. 5.—A Reuter despatch from Athens, filed on Friday, says that Professor Friedrich Kraus, of Berlin, and Professor Eisenberg, of Vienna, who attended King Constantine during his illness last spring, have returned to Athens to examine the wound left by the operation performed in June, which has not healed. The wound is giving the King some trouble, although his general condition is good.

Professor Eisenberg performed the operation, which consisted of removal of part of the tenth rib. The King was suffering from pleurisy. A London despatch of Friday said Professor Kraus and Eisenberg were expected to arrive at Athens from Kavala on a Greek destroyer to perform a slight operation on the King.

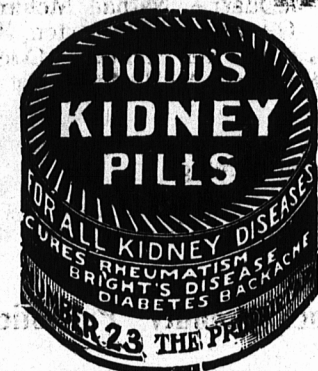
