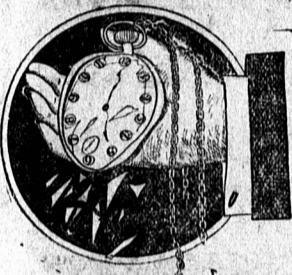

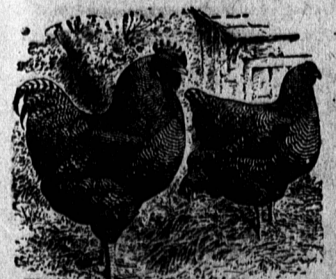

IN MEMORIAM

MISS ALETHA FEEHAN

It is with sincere feeling of sadness that The Guardian records the death of Aletha Feehan, eldest daughter of James W. Feehan of Savage Harbor, which sad event took place at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the 16th. Miss Feehan had been in delicate health for some months, but it was not until the middle of September that her illness assumed a serious nature so that she resigned her position as teacher at Mount Stewart. Since then, though she has had the best medical attention, grave hopes were entertained for her recovery. Death is always sad, but it is extremely so when one with such bright prospects for the future is called away in the bloom of youth at the early age of twenty. She was a girl of a gentle and lovable disposition and to know her was but to love her. The funeral left the house at 8 o'clock on Tuesday morning and a large concourse of friends followed the remains to St. Andrews Church, where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by her pastor Rev. A. P. McLellan. The pall-bearers were: Frank Feehan, George Morrison, Leo Smith, Joseph McKay, Walter Pigott and Wm. Pigott. Besides a sorrowing father and mother, one brother and two sisters are left, to whom the Guardian extends sincerest sympathy.—L.

SCOTT'S WIDOW DECLINES ROYAL OFFER OF ROOMS.

LONDON, Nov. 19.—Lady Scott, the widow of the Antarctic explorer, was offered recently a suite of rooms in the Hampton Court Palace by King George. The suites are given for life to the widows of eminent men who are unable to maintain their person with their private means. To the surprise of the King, Mrs. Scott declined the offer on the ground that she could not pursue her art as a seamstress at Hampton Court. Her refusal is understood to be really a protest against the scale on which the fund raised in memory of her husband and his fellow heroes has been distributed as between them and the permanent memorial. She thinks the fund should have been so divided as to place her above the necessity of being an object of royal benevolence.

THE WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Nov. 20.—Fresh to strong southeasterly shifting to southwesterly winds; mild and showery. THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was beautifully clear and mild; rain at night. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was forty-four degrees above zero and the lowest was thirty-eight above. The lowest the previous night was forty. At nine a.m. it was forty-four and at nine p.m. thirty-eight above.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 4.04 and tomorrow at 4.54; it rises tomorrow morning at 2.16 and Saturday at 4.06. The sun sets this afternoon at 4.23 and tomorrow at 4.23; it rises tomorrow morning at 7.09 and Saturday at 7.10. The moon rises tonight at 10.53. There was a full moon Thursday Nov. 18th at 7.11 p.m. The last quarter of the moon will be on Friday, Nov. 21st at 3.57 a.m. The length of today will be nine hours and fifteen minutes.

SILVER FOX TO BE PARIS PET FUR.

PARIS, Nov. 19.—Paris has discovered that Canadian fox shall dominate mink's furs during the present season.

There will be fox of every kind, from the beautiful silver fox, which costs \$2,000 for a silver skin, to the ordinary fox, dyed any color from bright lemon to black, of which one may have a good neck fur and muff for \$125.

For the frounces of the new crinoline model skirts, dainty trimmings of fur are used. Hats, small and beretta-like in shape, with long plumes, are made of fur too, grey mink being especially used.

The novelty of the season is the bright lemon-colored skin of the Japanese marten. It is a natural shade. This fur is used for trimmings for robes and stoles. The price of fur has risen 30 per cent in the last five years. These figures were given by the manager of one of the largest firms of French fur dealers. Neck fur and muff of Canadian fox, dyed black or lemon, \$125; Grey mink in coats, trimmed with fox, for walking, \$300; opera cloak, velvet, trimmed with fox, \$175; motor coat, velvet, trimmed with grey opossum \$175; hat as same fur as the walking coat, with plumes of aiset, \$80.

For the woman who places no limit to the price she pays for her furs, the walking coat of silver fox will cost \$4,000, while her opera coat of sable or Peruvian chinchilla cannot be had for less than \$15,000.
