EDITORIAL NOTES.

Next to France herself the United States will make the largest display at the Paris Exposition.

Never before in the history of Charlottetown were so many flags flung to the breeze on St. Patrick's Day as were seen on Saturday. The day was fine, and the community generally was quite taken with the spirit of the anniversary.

During the debate in the Imperial Parliament on the war loan the Chancellor of the Exchequer announced that South Africa and the Transvaal would be charged with such part of the war expenses as they are able to bear. This is the first official intimation that we have seen bearing upon this important point.

Sir Louis Davies has wired President Hughes of the Board of Trade that the Stanley will be held in readiness to take advantage of the earliest opportunity to open the navigation to this port. There are differing opinions as to the practicability of this being done immediately, but there is only one opinion as to leaving the harbor of Charlottetown opened as early as possible.

We can hardly realise the difference between the European continental Sunday and the day as it is observed in our own land. We get a hint of the difference in reading that the World's Exposition in Paris will be first opened to the public on Easter Sunday. Few centres have been so scourged with war and revolution as France within 125 years past. There may be a closer connection than we think between Sabbath desecration and national disaster.

THE GUARDIAN regrets to record the death of Mr. Thomas Alley, one of Charlottetown's oldest citizens and father of the late Judge Alley. He was born in this city nearly eighty years ago when this city was little more than a village. During his long lifetime he was identified with many of the city's interests. Several of the public buildings were designed and erected by him. For several years he held the post of Superintendent of Public Works for the Province. He had excellent natural abilities and more than usual literary taste, had been an extensive reader and his retentive memory enabled him to retain much of what he had read after his failing eyesight had deprived him of the solace otherwise to be derived from books.

"Who is the Khan?" was asked of THE GUARDIAN over the telephone yesterday, with reference to two or three poems over that pen name which recently appeared in this journal. The Khan's real name is Robert Kirkland Kernighan, whose present address is Rockton, Ont. He was born in 1857 on a farm at Rockton, near Hamilton. His father was a native of Ireland. He was educated at a common school and is unmarried. Mr. Kernighan, when not 20 years of age joined the staff of the Hamilton Spectator as local editor, and later became editor of the Winnipeg Sun. He is most widely known for his patriotic and humorous verse, a volume of which was published in 1896 with the title "The Khan's Canticles". The pen name is made from the first and last three letters of his family name, Kernighan. The Week speaking of Mr. Kernighan's poetical work, says: "He writes poetry as the bird sings--because he cannot help it; and his verse has all the varying charm of humor, pathos and naturalness."

It is almost too much to hope, as our despatches intimate that the whole of the Free State can now be subjected without further serious fighting south of the Transvaal border. But the effect of Lord Roberts' strategy has so far been marvellous.

Our despatches tell of the opening up of the railway southward from Bloemfontein to Colesberg. The vast importance of this will be apparent as it gives direct railway communication with both Port Elizabeth and Cape Town. Hitherto the supplies for Lord Roberts' new large army were carted across the veldt, a distance of 100 miles from the railway which connects Kimberly with Cape Town.

S. S. STANLEY COMING.

It is understood that the 'Steamer' will enter this Port Today if the ice will permit.

A meeting of the Council of the Board of Trade was held on Saturday afternoon. The following resolution was passed:

Resolved that the Department of Marine and Fisheries be requested to place one of the winter steamers on the Picton Charlottetown route without delay in order to bring freight direct to Charlottetown. It is understood that the Marine agent intends placing the Stanley on the Picton Charlottetown route today. She will sail from Georgetown in the morning for Picton leaving Picton in the afternoon for this port. The following is the telegraphic communication between Mr. George E. Hughes, President of the Board of Trade, and Sir Louis Davies on the matter previous to the meeting.

"Sir Louis H. Davies, Minister of Marine, Ottawa.

"Minto clear. Stanley ready for sea Council strongly urge sending her to Picton tomorrow, thence to Charlottetown with freight. Believe can make here easily now.

To George E. Hughes, President Charlottetown Board of Trade:

"My advices are that Strait is filled with ice four to ten feet thick. Stanley will be kept ready to take advantage at the earliest feasible opportunity.

MONTAGUE IN DARKNESS.

McDonald's Mill Dam Carried Away by a Freshet.

A Montague despatch to THE GUARDIAN states that McDonald's mill dam was carried away by the freshet on Friday evening. The water in the river was much higher than usual and it is thought that a dam farther up the river was carried away. Mr. McDonald had the dam repaired during the past summer and the loss is very great. The electric light dynamo which gives light to the town derived power in the mill. It will take a week to make repairs. The new bridge on what is known as the new road between Valleyfield and Whim Road Cross was very badly damaged.
