New Telephone Office For S'ide Is Assured

But Site Is Not Yet Certain; Installation Of Dial System Is Being Discussed.

The Island Telephone Company has decided to construct a new building in Summerside this year and if no better site can be obtained, then the present wooden office on Water Street will be replaced by a modern structure.

Mr. D. M. Gass, manager of the Company said last night, He had been asked to comment on rumors yesterday that the Company had decided to re-build on the present site and that a dial system would be installed.

Mr. Gass said there "until a possibility" that permission would be given by the Town to build a new office on Church Street. Earlier the Town Council turned down a request for a building permit at that location.

The Company was looking, also, for any other suitable location in the business section but to date nothing had been found.

So far as the dial rumors was concerned, Mr. Gass said that a proposal to discontinue the manual system had been made in re-made. Such a change would have to be approved both by the directors of the Company and by the subscribers in the Town.

It would mean a 25 cents per month increase in rates. The question of availability of supplies for an automatic system would also have to be considered.
