France, May 5, 1917.
Mr. Geo. Wood,
North Tryon,
P. E. I.
Dear Mr. Wood,
The official notification of your son's death would not I am sure, give you details as to how your brave boy died.

Your son joined my section as a signaller some months ago and soon became one of the best liked boys in the section. In the last fight we were in, your boy was in charge of the forward signal station, a post of honor Sir, and one at which he acquitted himself in a most heroic style, setting an example for the boys under him in his fearless and readiness to go out and repair the telephone lines under the heaviest fire.

He did his duty Sir, and made the supreme sacrifice, you may be proud of your boy, and know Sir, that we of the Signal Section remember our comrades when we again meet the Huns. I extend you my heartfelt sympathy and all the boys are with me in this respect. We lost a good comrade Sir, but his memory will remain as a brave boy.

I am sorry Sir, I cannot find words to express my sympathy better to a father who has given such a son to Canada. But we are all in God's hand and He will reward his children.

IN MEMORIAM

MRS. DUNCAN McLENNAN.

A death which caused widespread regret, took place at Westland on May 24th in the person of Margaret Bruce, relict of the late Mr. Duncan McLennan, in the 70th year of her age. Of late the family has been greatly afflicted. In December last a devoted husband and father was called away. In March the news was received that many learned with deep sorrow, that an esteemed son, the Chief of Police of Vancouver had been shot by a ruffian. In April came another anxious item of news, that another faithful son Bruce, a member of the 105th Battalion, had been seriously wounded at the front. This could not but weigh heavily on one, so attached to husband, so fond of sons, as Mrs. McLennan. She was a devoted member of the Presbyterian Church, of Wood Islands. The commendations of praise towards her that were uttered on the day of her burial, manifested her excellent qualities were many, and that the community has lost one of its esteemed women. She has left to mourn three daughters and six sons.—Mrs. Arthur S. Hayes, Malden, Mass; Mrs. (Dr.) Edwin D. Carder, Vancouver; Miss Mary, at home; Alex., Munroe, at home; John at Montague; Murdoch Bruce, in Vancouver; David in Rossland; James D. Bruce, above mentioned, who was wounded at Vimy Ridge and is now in hospital in Edinburgh, Scotland. Mrs. A. F. Bruce, Valleyfield, is a brother of the deceased. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. M. D. MacLeod, Caledonia, assisted by Capt. the Rev. J. C. Martin, Montague.

WASHINGTON— Returns filtering into Provost Marshal General Crowder's office today indicated that exemption may exceed 50 per cent of the war registration.
This, however, did not far surpass official expectations, inasmuch as a large share of the claims are based on the dependency of relatives.
All exemption claims will be carefully examined to determine whether or not they are bona fide, but the indications are that only a small percentage has hidden "behind the women's skirts" to be freed from military service, or has claimed exemption on the ground of "conscientious objection" to war. In cases of conscientious objections the applicant, if otherwise eligible, will not be exempted from some form of military service. If he proves fully conscientious, objectionable, he will probably be used in work behind the lines.
If he fails to prove his statement at all he will be subject to actual bearing of arms.
Official returns are coming in slowly, though they began to speed up today, and will probably be on in full blast tomorrow. The fact that 10,000,000 men have registered is available for military service will have a tremendous psychological effect in Germany, it is believed, showing the great resources in man power that will be aligned against her.

RUSSIAN WOMEN ASK TO FIGHT SAME AS MEN.
PETROGRAD, via, London— Two hundred girl students of the Petrograd Technical Institute have entered their names on the rolls of a female regiment which is being raised by Eastern Butchikoff. The aim is immediately to start to the front and to fight in all respects under the same conditions as men.
Scores of girls and women, anxious to fight, appeared today at the offices of the League on Equal Rights for Women, which has expressed its approval of Lieutenant Butchikoff's plan.

PARIS— "The French Government is deeply impressed with the results of the American enrollment for war," declared M. Jules Cambon, former minister, today.
"Officials realize that a certain time must elapse before there can be thorough co-operation with Europe, but meanwhile they are struck with the preparations to date. Knowledge of American preparations may be the deciding factor to victory for the Allies."
M. Cambon declared the Russian situation "was improving."
"History," he said, "demonstrates that the Russian temperament is Oriental and hence is easily influenced by Occidental thought."
"This is the only bad feature of the Stockholm peace conference, which is otherwise unimportant, with neither France, England or Italy participating."
