Council Recommends Grant For Sufferers

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 12.—The finance committee of the Halifax City Council tonight recommended \$2,500 be voted for the relief of sufferers in New England's hurricane-devastated districts.

The recommendation recalled the generous assistance given Halifax by New England when an explosion laid waste this city in December, 1917. The Nova Scotia Government already has voted \$5,000 for New England relief.

Approval of the city council at a meeting tomorrow night is expected to be merely a matter of form.
