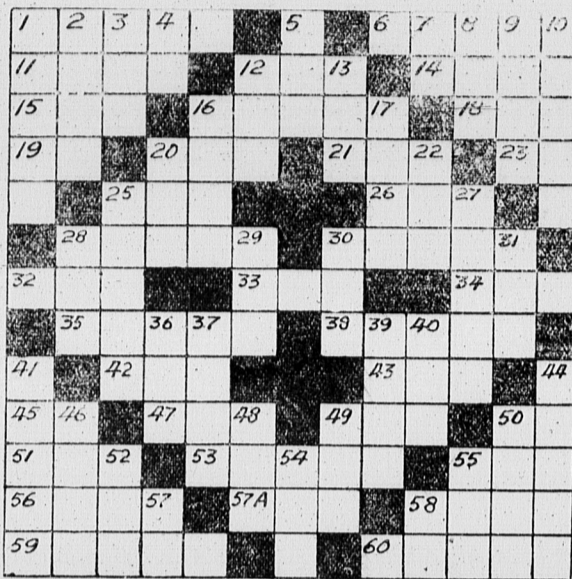

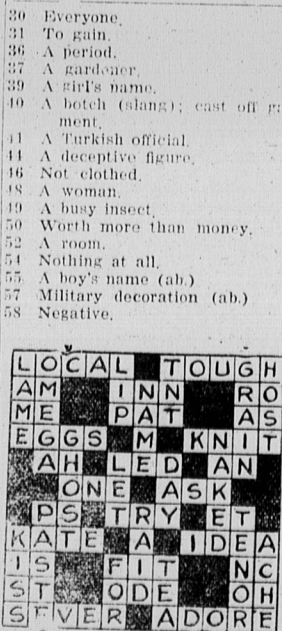
Children Will Show Appreciation To Sailor Heroes

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 3.—Dominion livestock. There were 61 cattle, 8 sheep, 578 hogs and 701 calves for sale on the two markets this morning. The cattle were mostly canners and just common to medium cows and were sold at prices ranging from \$2.00 to \$4.50. Veal calves were strong at \$9.00 to \$11.00. There was a large percentage of common quality calves and some very poor ones, twenty five of the latter kind were held for post-mortem inspection. Shippers should bear in mind that it is illegal to trade in young immature swine.

There was a good demand for hogs. Selects were sold for \$12.35 and sows for \$10.50 to \$10.75. The balance of the hogs were sold in mixed lots at \$12.50 to \$12.75 according to weight and quality, fed and watered basis.

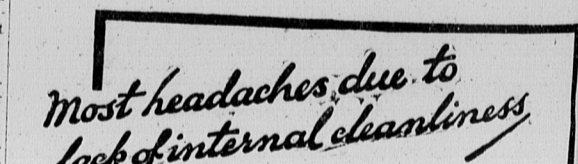

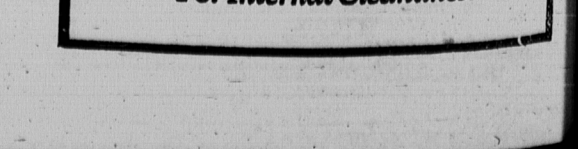
