First Losing Week On N. Y. Exchange Since September

NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (AP)—The stock market Saturday finished its first losing week since mid-September with liquidation drying up and assorted favorites edging timidly toward recovery. Throughout last week dealings were among the liveliest of the year with Fridays volume crossing the 1,000,000-mark for the 10th successive session. Earnings, dividends and business optimism still provided bolstering arguments but offerings became more insistent after Monday's advance. Professionals cashed profits and there were reports of institutional selling based on the idea that the list had approached the highs of last July and failed to follow through. In the final brief session some short covering and cautious bidding was noted. The list may have been oversold. Numerous brokerage clients, however, held aloof to await Congressional response to the President's address to the country on stemming living costs and aiding foreign governments. The Associated Press 60-stock composite was up .1 of a point at 3.3 but showed a net loss of .7 on the week. Low-quoted motors again were the fastest movers in the last session but only Continental Motors managed to gain a small fraction. Approved were Bethlehem, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Western Union, North American, Anaconda, Phelps Dodge, Du Pont, National Supply, Bendix Home Appliances, Standard Oil (N.J.), N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Great Northern Railway and Baltimore and Ohio. Canadian issues were unchanged. Disappointing earnings figures depressed Crucible Steel, Republic Steel, Eversharp, Slipping on the day were General Motors, Republic Steel, Goodrich, Sperry, Kennecott, Texas Co., Westinghouse, Johns-Manville and Chesapeake and Ohio.

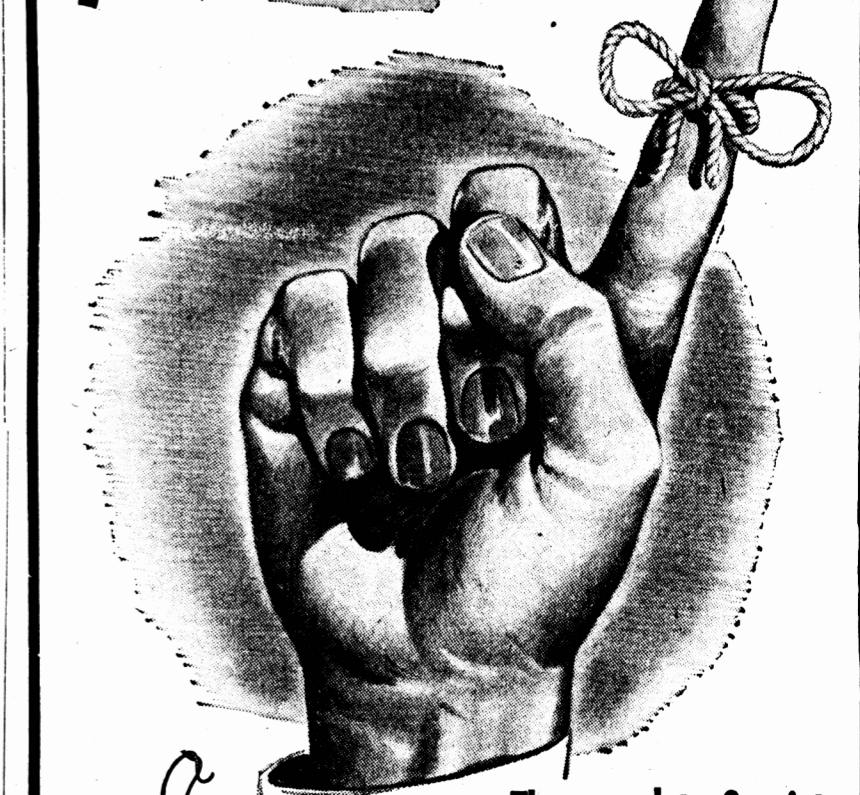

Weekly Live Stock

SUMMARY Pressure of seasonally heavy supplies of live stock, coupled with lack of adequate facilities to handle arrivals due to the packing house strike, resulted in a somewhat disturbed market this week and lower prices. Declines of 25c to 50c were noted in cattle prices at principal markets and some recession was noted in other classes of live stock. Eastern Cattle Markets Cattle prices were weak to lower at TORONTO and there was a fairly heavy holdover at the close. Packers took only a relatively small number and local butchers were unable to handle the balance of the supply. Some top weighty steers brought \$15.00, others \$14.50 downward, and butcher steers were generally \$12 to \$14 and an odd \$14.25. Warnings were being issued to shippers that prospects for clearing the increased offerings were not bright. Similar conditions prevailed at MONTREAL where commission agents were advising shippers to hold off until present supplies are cleared. Trading here was slow but some common to medium steers sold from \$13.75 down to a low of \$9. In the MARITIMES no quotations were issued for cattle or calves, due to the strike situation. Western Cattle Markets Following recent strong markets in the west and despite the strike situation, deliveries were stepped up in the past week and while WINNIPEG fairly well cleaned up the supply offered, most selling classes were 25c to 50c lower, with the practical top on steers around \$14 and a good number going on eastern orders at \$11.50 to \$13. The better grades of stockers and feeders were in good demand at \$11 to \$12. Fair action was seen at EDMONTON on a light offering, with best steers at \$14. PRINCE ALBERT had some choice steers up to \$12.50; MOOSE JAW some mediums at \$11.50; while SASKATOON was strike-bound and REGINA had some sales up to \$13.50. VANCOUVER placed some good heavy feed-lot steers at \$14. Exports to United States Shipments of dairy cattle to the United States in the past week totalled 990 head as against 1,138 in the same week a year ago. This year's exports since January 1st totalled 41,723 compared with 55,908 in the corresponding period last year. The Calf Market Calf prices were little changed on the meagre offerings. Toronto paid \$15.50 to \$18.50 for best veals, while Montreal had only common to medium quality on offer up to a top of \$15.50. Winnipeg sold some light veals at \$14 to \$15. Edmonton \$13, Prince Albert some good heavies at \$11; Moose Jaw up to \$13, Regina \$13.
