SUDDEN DEATH.— Another sudden death occurred in Charlottetown Friday, Mrs. McQuaid, wife of Mr. Owen McQuaid, a fireman of the P. E. I. R. got up in the morning as usual and called her nephew, Mr. Pranght, who resides at her home. When Mr. Pranght left for his work Mrs. McQuaid appeared to be in her usual good health. Mr. McQuaid runs the Murray Harbor train which Friday morning arrived in Charlottetown at 10.30. After taking his engine to the barn and repairing, Mr. McQuaid left for home, arriving there about eleven o'clock, where to his dismay he found his wife cold in death lying upon the floor. Doctors were called but found that life was extinct. In view of the circumstances Dr. Johnson, the Coroner, who was one of the doctors called, decided that an inquest was unnecessary and that death was due to heart failure. Besides the husband, two sons, Clifton in Ontario, and Vernon in Texas with the O'Blate Fathers. Mrs. McQuaid is a native of Fort Augustus, where she and her husband resided before coming to Charlottetown some years ago.

The Lady Sybil will take freight from Halifax and if the ice has sufficiently cleared will call at Pictou, then proceeding to Souris and the Magdalen Islands says a Halifax exchange.

The Honorable Charles Dalton has given another instance of his public spirited benevolence in the shape of a \$50,000 gift to St. Dunstan's College payable in annual instalments of \$5,000 for ten years.

This announcement was made to The Guardian yesterday afternoon by His Lordship the Bishop of Charlottetown and at a late hour last night a representative of the Guardian interviewed the generous donor who confirmed the announcement, modestly requesting that little should be said on the subject.

The gift is entirely unsolicited and like all of Mr. Dalton's benefactions, spontaneous; moreover it is without conditions and will be utilized for the benefit of the College in such manner as the Bishop and governors may deem best.

St. Dunstan's College was opened for the reception of students in January 1855, the first rector being the Rev. Angus McDonald who directed the destinies of the new college with distinguished ability and success until 1860. In the arduous work connected with the opening and management of the institution, he was ably assisted by Rev. James Phelan, at that time a young ecclesiastic, now Monsignor Phelan, V. G. of Charlottetown.

In 1892, the College was affiliated to the University of Laval, Quebec. This important step placed it on a new footing, and indeed formed an epoch in the history of the institution.

The present rector is Rev. Terence Campbell under whose able guidance the college is taking a foremost place not only in the province but throughout Canada.
