It was all done before Brooklyn Dodgers' final futile victory over the Phils at Philadelphia was posted on the scoreboard.

Ernie White pitched a five-hitter and his teammates locked up the result with a four-run outburst in the fifth inning. Then it was just a matter of course that Cards captured their fifth straight and 106th victory of the year against 48 defeats.

The Cardinals, supremely confident, routed two Chicago pitchers in two big rallies. They drove their old teammate, Lon Warneke, out of the box in the fifth inning with a four-run blast. St. Louis was leading in the seventh, sending relief pitcher Hiram Bithorn to the showers, and then showed no mercy on Vern Olsen and Jake Mooty, who finished.

Dodger Victory To No Avail
At Philadelphia, as pitcher Kirby Higbe bent over to pick up the ball from the mound to start the third inning against the Phils he glanced toward the scoreboard. He practically froze in the bending position. For the board showed St. Louis Cardinals had just scored four runs against Chicago Cubs, and the Dodgers' hope to tie the Cards for the flag had slipped.

They went on to win their game from the Phils, 4-3, but it was just another ball game, ending the season.
