## DESERVING OF ASSISTANCE

For the past three years the commiseration of citizens has been extended to a cripple who has been living in the city and has only been able to move through the streets by walking on his hands.

The unfortunate man is William Lerner, the adopted son of Thomas and Mrs. Lerner, who removed from Grand Trappe to the city several years ago. He is thirty six years of age and has been a cripple almost from birth. He was able to use his lower limbs till he was four years of age, but since that time by the action of rheumatism they have shrunk up till they have now almost completely disappeared.

For a number of years he moved about on his hands without difficulty but recently he has begun to fall, and if he falls, he is unable to get up. Another means of conveyance is it probable that his life will not be long. Lerner is industrious and has always tried to do what he can to provide a means of livelihood for himself. At the present time he is conducting a small store at the foot of

Hillsboro Street and thus eking out for himself a meagre subsistence.

A vehicle can be provided for him for a sum not much in excess of \$100. By this means he could wheel himself by his hands and a life which has been one of much trouble and suffering in the past may be spared to enjoy life for many years to come.

Several leading citizens have already intimated that they are willing to subscribe towards the purchase of a carriage for him and doubtless there are many more who will be glad to avail themselves of an opportunity to assist in a worthy and deserving object.

A prominent commercial man has already contributed a sum of money towards this very commendable object with the suggestion that The Guardian place the case before the public and receive any subscriptions that kind hearted persons may give.

The Guardian will be glad to receive and acknowledge subscriptions towards this end. It is hoped that the desired object will shortly be accomplished.
