### Would Enlarge Common Markets

BRUSSELS, Dec. 12 (AP).—The chamber of deputies has authorized the government to continue negotiations with France, Holland and Great Britain for the purpose of arriving at an economic understanding and enlarging common markets. The Chamber's action was a defeat for the Socialists, who had argued that negotiations be aimed specifically at economic union involving Belgium, France and Holland. Liberals and Catholics combined to defeat this project. The chamber's vote was construed as an expression of confidence in the government. No announcement was made of the vote tally.

### Gar Wood Out For World Record

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 12.—Gar Wood's slim craft, Miss America IX and her 2,200 horsepower engines are tuned again for a burst of speed in quest of the elusive world's speedboat record. The veteran pilot and his mechanic, Orin Johnson, are ready to take the Miss America IX to the measured nautical mile course off Indian Creek here as soon as possible, probably Monday, in an attempt to bring the record back to the United States. The 110-mile an hour record is now held by Kaye Don, British boat and automobile driver.

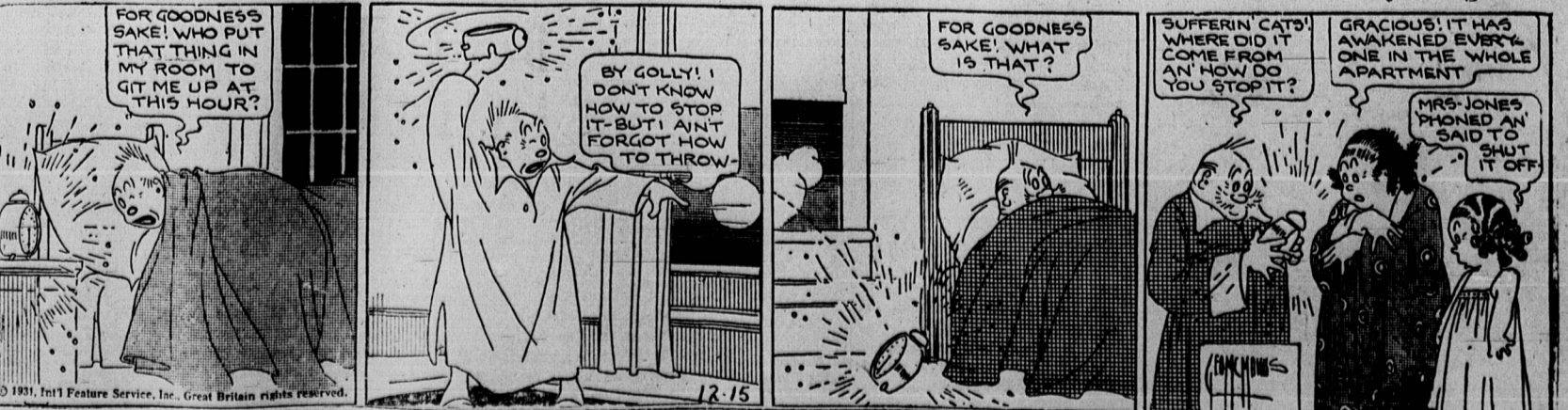

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec 12.—Theodore E. Ferris, marine architect, recently presented plans before the annual convention of the Society of Naval Architects and Marine Engineers to show that superliners with approximately the same speed as navy cruisers could also be mounted with six-inch gun batteries in time of emergency and be driven from the sea by only one type of war vessel.

Present world naval treaties have brought about a new relation between naval vessels and high speed merchant vessels, he said, and the treaties limit the size of cruisers to 10,000 tons standard displacement which places a practical limit on the speed of the cruisers, which is between 32 and 33 knots. Merchant vessels can, under the present state of the art of shipbuilding, be built for approximately the same speed as 10,000 ton cruisers and at the same time carry a sufficient number of passengers to meet reasonable commercial requirements. They are better and steadier sea boats in heavy weather. They can keep to the sea indefinitely, if provided with a supply of fuel oil. They have a cruising radius of about 8,500 miles at 15 knots speed and they are excellent troop ships. In fact they are super-six-inch auxiliary cruisers.
