

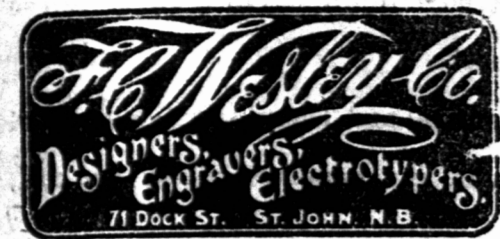

IN answer to inquiries regarding the 86 trips across the Atlantic made by James Paton as stated in The Guardian a few days ago it may be explained that for eighteen consecutive years with one break Mr. Paton, made two visits to Europe each year thus crossing the "herring pond" fifty eight times. From '75 he has made continuous spring visits to England with the exception of three years, which the junior partner took his place, the first of which will be remembered from the accident which befell the Island men at Skerryvore. These with the additional trips will make his forty-third visit to the Old Land, showing that he will have crossed the Atlantic 83 times should he safely arrive at Liverpool. As far as can be learned this record in the dry goods line has only been equalled by one other dry goods man in Canada, the latter claiming over one hundred.

**A YOUNG WOMAN SUICIDES**

She Had Been Melancholy for Some Time

BUT IMPROVED RECENTLY

Sunday Night Shot Herself in her Bedroom and Died Yesterday Morning.

The sad news of the suicide of Miss Edith Sims, aged 33 years, which occurred yesterday at her home in French River has filled the community in which she lived with sadness. The deceased who was the daughter of Lemuel Sims of that place had been in ill health and melancholy for the past three or four years but recently seemed in much better spirits than usual.

About ten o'clock Sunday night the other members of the family retired leaving the unfortunate girl alone in the kitchen. She remained there about half an hour and then went to her room taking with her the double barrel breach loading gun in which she had inserted a cartridge. Resting the butt against the bureau and the muzzle against her side she pulled the trigger.

In a moment the report brought to the room her father who found her lying with a terrible wound in her abdomen.

Dr. Campbell was immediately sent for but he was powerless to do anything and she passed away at five o'clock yesterday morning.

The sad news was communicated to Dr. K. McNeill of this City, Coroner for Queen's County by Albert Simpson, J. P. yesterday forenoon. The doctor asked Mr. Simpson to ascertain the facts and determine if a inquest were necessary.

Sorrowing parents, three brothers and three sisters at home besides John C. traveller for the Dominion Packing Co., and Ernest, a student at the Charlottetown Business College, are left to mourn their loss.

Turner sang a solo, "The Land of the Maple" in the chorus of which she was assisted by the children. After the presentation of a vote of thanks to the lecturer a very profitably spent evening was concluded by all joining in the National Anthem. Miss Mary Barclay presided very acceptably at the organ.
