The new year, it is believed that more details of proposed new legislation will be given and it would not be surprising if plans are revealed for statutory provisions designed to deal in a large way with business, employment and economic security. Mr. Bennett maintains that all the trade treaties he has made have been good ones. He will not endanger that record by negotiating one with the United States which will not be fair to Canada. He has frequently declared. But it is known his departmental officials have recently drawn up a basis for negotiation for a reciprocal trade treaty they believed fair to both United States and Canada, and only the indifference of the United States government, or its inability to negotiate, would prevent consummation of an agreement. 27,000 EXPELLED

As hundreds of Hungarians, ordered out of the Slav kingdom, streamed across the border, the government gave as its official explanation of their expulsion the fact that the 27,000 had lived 16 years in Yugoslavia without forsaking their allegiance to Hungary. (Available records show 400,000 Hungarians live in Yugoslavia, but most of these have become naturalized Yugoslavs.) L-3049

Yugoslav View

The Belgrade government does not wish the presence of the un-naturalized Hungarians to be used as the basis for agitation for revision of treaties whereby parts of the Slav kingdom might revert to Hungary, it was stated. In an exclusive interview M. Parich, assistant minister for foreign affairs, declared stories originating in Hungary that those expelled were badly treated were untrue. "Thousands of those slated for expulsion," he said, "have been allowed up to 10 days to wind up their affairs, while no legitimate requests for delay have been refused." L-3049

Appeal to League

BUDAPEST, Dec. 6.—A Hungarian appeal against Yugoslavia's expulsion of Hungarians went forward to the League of Nations today as the Cabinet was called into special session to discuss the new issue arising between the two nations. With refugees from the Slav kingdom pouring into Hungary by the hundreds, the government took drastic steps to forestall incidents that might increase the prevailing tension. Indignation ran high in Budapest after many refugees asserted they were hurried out of Yugoslavia without being given time to gather their possessions. L-3049

Take Testimony

Government officials went to Szeged and other frontier stations to take testimony from refugees concerning their alleged ill treatment, but authorities were representative as apprehensive that the situation might lead to an open break with Yugoslavia and hence newspapers were instructed to keep silence concerning number or condition of the arrivals. (8 o'clock News) hinted however, that the Hungarian appeal to the League would be based on the clause of the peace treaty which guarantees the protection of national minorities. A government spokesman said the Budapest government would be justified in expelling Yugoslav citizens would not take such steps until after action at Geneva. (Belgrade dispatches said one reason for the Yugoslav action in ordering 27,000 Hungarians out of the country was the fact that Hungary had refused to extend labor permits of several hundred Yugoslavs living in Hungary.)
