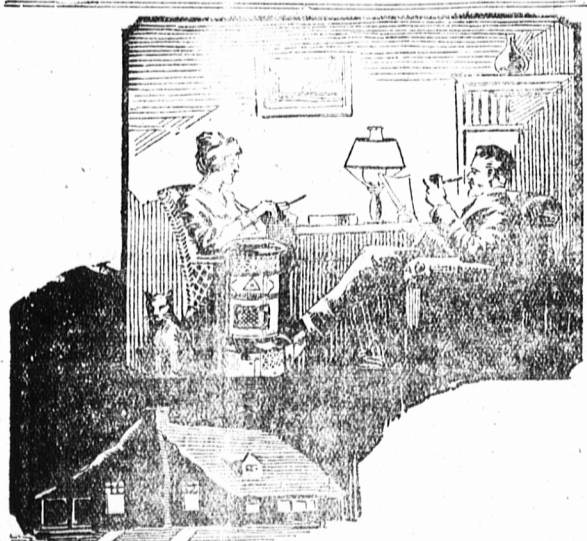
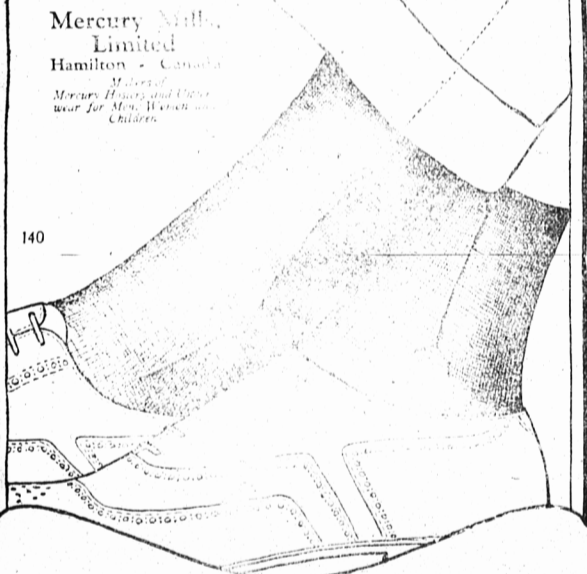

# FOR MIDNIGHT POSTING FROLIC DUNCAN MUST PAY 700 FRANCS

### Attack on Robert Bourbeau, Charged with Aiding Duncan's Son to Escape, Brings Advocate of Simple Life to Court and Penalty.

PARIS, Nov. 14.—(Raymond) Duncan, advocate of the simple life, must pay 700 francs for the pleasure he had in posting on the walls of Paris his opinion of Robert Bourbeau. When Mr. Duncan's son, Menakas, left his parents' home several months ago to escape wearing a Grecian costume out of doors and eating only vegetables at home, the elder Duncan accused M. Bourbeau of aiding and abetting his son to run away. Later, Mr. Duncan passed through the city at midnight one night on a bill posting expedition and Paris

gaspd the next morning at what it read. Had not M. Bourbeau shown how little hurt he really felt by having his own portrait exhibited representing him in an automobile and gazing toward the offensive statement placarded in the background, Duncan probably would have been condemned to pay more than the 700 francs. The opinion of the trial judge was that Duncan really believed himself injured by Bourbeau, and this was given as an extenuating circumstance when the verdict of 200 francs damage and 500 francs fine was rendered.

## Home Nursing And Health Hint

### THE SCHOOL NURSE SCORES

And he thought of the many, many times he had sat across the table from her under the evening lamp; how her hair had changed from gold to silver; how the roses and dimples had faded from her cheeks.

The truth was that Farmer Jones had attended the local Board of Health meetings in the village. He had listened to the report of the new school nurse, an institution, as he insisted upon calling her, to which he had been vigorously opposed when, several months before, a school nurse had been decided upon by various members of the board who were younger than he and more tractable.

### Nurse Had Impressed Him

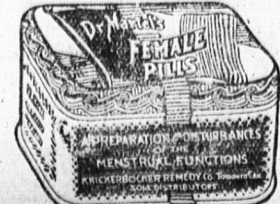

## Counter Terms Of N. Ireland

BELFAST, Nov. 15.—According to J. Milne Barbour, Secretary to the Ministry of Finance in the Ulster Government, which returned to Belfast yesterday after participating in the Northern Cabinet meeting at London, the counter-proposals submitted to Prime Minister Lloyd George may be summed up as follows:

"The only concession Ulster will make is to accept dominion home rule for herself.  
"The expression 'Dominion Government' must always be construed in the light of Ulster's remaining a separate and distinct unit in the free nations composing the British Empire.

"Ulster will never submit to any authority being placed, either directly or indirectly, above the Northern Parliament that would in any way detract from the authority exercised by His Majesty through the Imperial Parliament.

"We expect that if, in order to restore peace and order in Ireland, the Imperial-Parliament give any terms to the South more advantageous than those already possessed by Ulster, equally advantageous terms will be extended to Ulster."  
Meanwhile the outlook in the six counties is made gloomier than ever by the decision of the Imperial Government to sever all connections with the maintenance of law and order on November 22. The future police force of the six counties will consist of the portion of the Royal Irish Constabulary which may be serving in Ulster and the whole-time section of the Ulster Special Constabulary, 4,000 strong, strengthened as necessity arises by men from the part-time section, comprising 2,000 men.

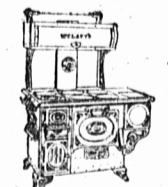

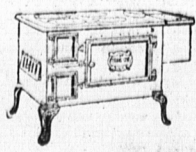
