"I hate Mrs. Glover. If she is tried I shall be glad to go down to Boston and be a witness against her. I shall only tell what I know, but that will be enough. I suppose she will lose all her fellows.

"She talked terribly about her husband. I heard her. I do not think it is right for a woman to talk straight at her husband.

"I wanted to be married, and when I am married I shall always be a good girl.

"Mrs. Glover said things that were not true when she was on the witness stand. Almost everything she said was not true when she said that she did not know that I was hiding under the bed. I was under there three days.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY

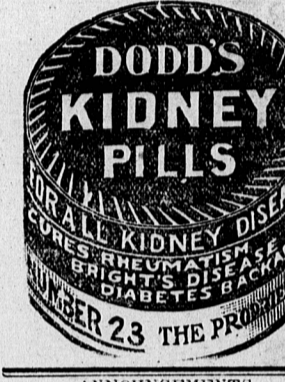
