
PASSES AGED 102

FARMERS PLOW IN WARMER WEATHER

Prince Edward Island farmers were plowing Saturday, as the weather man did a right-about-face from the Arctic blast which blanketed the province yesterday and much to restore roads to a more normal condition. Rainfall was 0.78 inches in the 24-hour period ending with 8 o'clock yesterday morning. Mr. Warren Burns, meteorologist at the Charlottetown Experimental Station said. During Saturday night wind velocity of 35-miles-per hour was recorded. Yesterday temperatures varied between 37 and 34 degrees above zero.

AIRPORT OFFICIALS HERE

Work on Charlottetown's new civic airport at Sherwood was being closed down for the season it was understood following the visit here of three Department of Transport officials. Mr. C. H. Edgett, chief purchasing agent, Ottawa, Mr. E. C. Percy, inspector of eastern airways, and Mr. G. H. Nice, accountant eastern division, both of Moncton returned to the mainland yesterday. They were passengers on the Canadian Airways plane which was grounded Saturday because of freezing rain. The three Department of Transport officials arrived here last Wednesday. Mr. Percy announced he had "nothing for publication" concerning his visit. Work at the new civic airport was discontinued following the blizzard on November 25. Prior to that men had been employed clearing stumps from the recently acquired property. If weather conditions remained favorable it was hoped the work would continue until Christmas, it was announced at the last meeting of the City Council.
