**HUGH BUST OF MAGNATE MADE.**

NEW YORK, July 3.—James J. Hill is the subject of perhaps the largest bust ever made in this country, one which, when it is cast in bronze, will be six feet high and have a spread of shoulders of five feet. The clay model was completed recently in the studio of Finn H. Frohlich, in the Alpine building. The bronze casting will weigh one thousand pounds. Mr. Frohlich, in starting to make his large model began with five hundred pounds of clay.

This proved to be about enough for the top of the head. He has used a ton and a half of the plastic material. The weight of the model is supported by heavy armatures of wood and steel.

The bust is to be presented to the Yukon-Alaska exposition on Minnesota Day, and later it is to adorn the state university's grounds at Seattle. A pedestal of Washington granite is being prepared, for which Baron Takahira, the Japanese ambassador at Washington, has given one block and Governor Johnson of Minnesota, another. Including the pedestal, this monument to "A Pioneer of the Great Northwest" will stand twenty-two feet high.

Mr. Frohlich spent ten days in St. Paul making his small model and although he found Mr. Hill a very busy man, he managed in that space of time to get some satisfactory sittings. The likeness is excellent and reveals the strength of character which distinguishes Mr. Hill.

Mr. Frohlich was a pupil of Daniel B. French and also studied in the Ecole des Beaux Arts, in Paris.

**DEATH CAUSED BY BROWN TAIL MOTH.**

KITTEBY, Maine, July 3—A death, said to have been due to brown tail moth poisoning, occurred here yesterday, the victim being Geo. H. Wilson, of Derry, N. H., a member of the local moth-fighting company.

He was taken ill about two weeks ago at his boarding place at Kitterby. The doctors say that he not only suffered from the external poisoning, but also inhaled the poison, while handling the moth-filled pieces of burlap on the trees.

**DEVELOPMENTS IN THE ELISNOR CASE.**

BOSTON, July 3—The case of John Elisnor, the contractor, who is charged with bigamy, is daily affording new sensations and new complications. It is now declared that it was not his wife, who was Miss Alice C. Wentzell, of Halifax, who stirred the police to arrest the contractor for bigamy, but a relative of hers, living here, who has not even informed Mrs. Elisnor of the move. Mrs. Elisnor is now in Nova Scotia. It also develops that Elisnor filed a libel for divorce from his Nova Scotia wife a few days before he married wife No. 3, a western woman. When he married Miss Wentzell he was a widower. Elisnor is out on bail, and both he and his wife made all attempts to secure a statement from them.

**FORMATION OF EMPIRE PRESS ASSOCIATION.**

LONDON, July 3—At a meeting of the Imperial Press Conference it was decided to form an Empire Press Association with headquarters in London.

The purpose is to consider all matters relating to the interests of the Empire as a whole and to arrange for other conferences.

The next conference will be held in Canada, if an invitation is sent in the name of the Press of the whole Dominion.

**MINE WORKERS IN SESSION AT HALIFAX.**

HALIFAX, July 3—The Union Mine Workers of America who have been in session since Tuesday, have completed their work. The result was that a strike will be called at all the collieries on Tuesday next, unless the operators meet the Executive Board and make a satisfactory settlement. The convention passed a resolution regarding the Alien Labor Law, condemning the Coal Companies in importing foreign labor or to the exclusion of native, and asking the different Governments to endeavor to keep out this foreign labor. They also passed a resolution condemning the Dominion Coal Company erecting fences about the Collieries, protecting them with wires, etc., and endangering the lives of the workmen.

President McDougall speaks very hopefully of the strike. He said they were prepared to hold out against the Company for two years if necessary.

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**LORD BERESFORD IN HIS USUAL ROLE**

LONDON, July 3—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford appeared before the London Chamber of Commerce yesterday in his favorite role of a candid critic of the naval administration. The effect of his speech, however, was to a certain extent, discounted by the apparently authoritative announcement that the Admiral has failed to establish his case before a committee of the Cabinet

and experts appointed at his own request, which has been sitting for some weeks past. Nevertheless, the Admiral declared that the situation in the Navy was more serious than was generally known and he said that in order to put the Empire in a state of safety by March, 1914, Great Britain would have to build 10 battleships, 18 second-class cruisers for the protection of commerce; 24 vessels of a new type larger than torpedo-boat destroyers, and 4 floating docks, as well as replenish the depleted stores of ammunition, coal, etc., and add 16,000 men to the personnel. This program would necessitate an expenditure of from \$275,000,000 to \$300,000,000.
