FIRST-CLASS HOTEL WANTED.

Within recent years from Vancouver to Quebec hotels have been built or are building, especially for the wealthy class of tourists who desire to fare luxuriously and are able and willing to pay for the sumptuous fare and skilled and assiduous attendance that is only obtainable in the greater hostleries of the world. This year Ottawa and Winnipeg, already well equipped compared with the cities of the Eastern Provinces, are embarking in new hotel enterprises upon a costly scale. Ottawa's new venture is a million dollar hotel building, to be furnished at further cost of an hundred thousand and upwards.

These are not wild cat ventures. They are based upon sound business principles. The very wealthy classes are those who travel most and it is needless to say they are these who disburse most freely and are the most profitable of hotel guests. But they are also the class who will not travel on routes where they cannot obtain hotel accommodation approximately as luxurious in appointment and as complete in attendance and service as they enjoy when at home. Hence a palace hotel once in operation brings to a city or province a class of visitors who without such hotel privileges would inevitably go elsewhere. And the advantages of securing this class of visitors is both direct and indirect. They spend money freely during their visit and they are frequently induced to invest in business enterprises of which otherwise they would have no knowledge and in which they would take no interest.

The time has undoubtedly come when a hotel of the first-class is needed in Charlottetown—not necessarily of the mammoth size so common in other cities, but complete and elegant in its appointments and in other ways satisfactory to tourists of luxurious tastes. Such a hotel would not probably interfere in any degree with the patronage of the Hotels we have. It would cater to the tastes and receive the patronage of a class who either do not visit our shores at all, or who come to us in very limited numbers. That it would pay is demonstrated by experiences of similar ventures elsewhere, and is shown also by the announced willingness of the Plant Line to take considerable stock in a hotel enterprise in this city.

It is true that the season of tourist travel in our northern latitude is but short, but in that short season a rich harvest may be reaped. It might and probably would be found advantageous to so construct and arrange the hotel that a large portion of it could be cut off to remain unused during the winter season when travel is light, thus saving the cost of heating. Then it is to be borne in mind that much might be done in the way of catering to persons and families who prefer to live at an hotel during the winter season—a practice which is already becoming quite extensive in Canadian cities and much more so in the cities of the Republic. By a process which practical hotel men well understand it would thus be easy to secure a very considerable patronage during the winter, sufficient to tide over the dull season, while a quick and generous harvest might be gathered during the heated summer term.

throughout the United States and Canada, and has been established in all the leading European countries, in Asia and Australia. It has accomplished incalculable good. Public telephones will shortly be installed on street corners in New Haven. The box will be kept locked but will open when a coin is dropped into the slot. When the door is thus opened the process of obtaining telephone connection is the same as in ordinary practice. Each box contains a full list of subscribers and their numbers. When the receiver is hung up at the close of a conversation the door of the box closes automatically and can only be re-opened by dropping another coin in the slot.

After the United States France had adopted the submarine boat as an appliance of naval warfare the British Admiralty have also determined to give it a trial. Five submarine boats are now being built at Harrow-on-Furness for the British navy. Each will measure 63 feet 4 inches in length and a beam of 11 feet 9 inches. The displacement when submerged will be 120 tons. The main engine will be of the gasoline type, 160 horse power, and will have a fuel capacity to run 400 knots with out replenishing. The boats are to run 9 knots an hour on the surface and 7 knots when submerged. Each will carry one torpedo tube and five torpedoes. The latter can be discharged when the boat is at rest, or running on the surface, while awash running or at rest, and while submerged and still or running at full speed.

**THE SHIP RAILWAY.**

Since 1825 when an imperial survey was made for a sloop canal, the project of a passage for ships through or over the isthmus of Chignecto has been from time to time before the country. Eventually the scheme of a ship railway, designed by the late Mr. Ketchum, C. E. was adopted, the Canadian Government becoming bound to pay a considerable subsidy for 20 years beginning with the completion of the work. The Company raised in England and expended over \$4,000,000 on the work. The grading was completed from shore to shore and the enormous rails to carry the ships were laid. Much excavation was done for the lifting docks at each end. Mr. Ketchum sunk his fortune in the work and has since died, after a vain effort to secure for the company an extension of time, which successive Governments Tory and Liberal have refused.

We are of those who think the company and especially the English investors have been hardly dealt with. In no other instance that we know of, in case of so large a contract carried on at so great an expenditure, has a reasonable extension been refused. In this case there was certainly a valid excuse. The enterprise was an entirely new one, as it is also one of vast importance to Canada and the world. It is important to demonstrate whether or not the carriage of ships overland is practicable. If it is practicable Canada's prestige would be enhanced by having the fact demonstrated. In any case the British investors, whose money is locked up and lost, are entitled to consideration. They will lose in any case if the railway is completed and found not to be workable, for in that case no subsidy will be paid and the Canadian Government will not lose a dollar. If on the other hand the scheme of a ship railway is practicable, as eminent engineers affirm it to be, it would be of advantage to Canada and the country could well afford to pay the subsidy. We therefore think that the company and the investors ought to have been given a reasonable extension of time within which to demonstrate the practicability of their project.

Mr. Provand M. P. representing the English investors in the ship railway venture has been recently in Ottawa, with what results we are not informed. We regard the ship railway as an undertaking, which if completed and proved to be successful in working would be especial advantage to Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island. This port would at once become the main Gulf port of a new line of greatly shortened navigation through the Bay of Fundy to St. John Portland, Boston and New York, with great possibilities that are as yet but faintly imagined.

At the time of the general election in November last it was confidently predicted that the defeated Opposition leaders would speedily find seats in the new Parliament. This forecast has not been realised. Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Hugh John Macdonald have definitely retired from political life. Neither Sir Adolphe Caron, George E. Foster, nor Dr. Montague have yet found seats and the new Parliament goes on its way with these and other notable vacancies on the Opposition side.
