The marriage will take place during Christmas week—Winnipeg Free Press. Many friends and relatives here will read the above with pleasure as Mr. Alley is a son of James A. and Mrs. Alley, of Saskatoon, formerly of this city. The marriage was to have taken place yesterday. Mr. Alley has been transferred to the Bank of Nova Scotia at Fort Francis, Ont., and leaves for there at the end of January. The Guardian wishes Mr. and Mrs. Alley many days of happiness.

Hon. J. H. Cummissey, C. P. W., came to the city last evening by the eastern train after spending Christmas with his family at Webster's corner, and enjoying luncheon with his venerable mother at five o'clock, at the old homestead at Glenham. Mr. Cummissey's mother is still hale and hearty and entered on her 30th year Christmas morning. She was born at Ankle's Grove near Amy Mills, Ireland. She came to this Province when very young and was married to the late Hugh Cummissey on the fifteenth day of February, 1847, and went with him then to the farm, on which she now lives with her youngest son, Hugh Cummissey. During the last 38 years the Commissioner visited his mother 36 times on her birthday.

The services in the S. A. ist and in his years of travel he has accumulated a store of episodes of travel and adventure which makes him a king of entertainers as a host.
