INJURED IN ACCIDENT.

TRURO, July 8.—An auto accident in which S. G. Chambers and his chauffeur were seriously hurt occurred near Great Village this afternoon.

The car contained besides the owner and driver, Miss Katie Hiltz and two children. Just as the car was well across a short bridge the machine swerved and forced the railing, turning upside down on the river bank. Miss Hiltz and the children were thrown clear and sustained minor injuries.

Mr. Chambers was pinned beneath the car and had numerous cuts from the broken glass shield on his face and head. Elby, the chauffeur went over the front and was jammed beneath the chassis and a tree. Both men remained there for half an hour until assistance was obtained from nearby houses.

Telephone messages were sent to Truro and autos with a doctor and assistants went down on a rush. Elby was unconscious when taken out of the wreck. He was attended on the spot and later brought to Truro. His condition is very serious.

Mr. Chambers' Miss Hiltz and the children came back in another car and received surgical attention. The cuts sustained by Mr. Chambers are severe but not regarded as dangerous. The damage to the car is considerable. The accident is said to be attributable to the inexperience of the man who was at the time being instructed to operate the machine.

WORK ON COURTENAY BAY.

CAPTAIN LOSES HIS CERTIFICATE.

HALIFAX, July 9.—The certificate of Captain W. W. Harsy, of the steamer Amelia, has been suspended for three months as a result of the formal investigation conducted by Captain W. R. Lugar, R. N., at the county court house yesterday morning, into the grounding of the Amelia at Boar's Head on the seventh of June last. The court held that the captain had been negligent of his duty and was responsible for the stranding of the vessel and that had he maintained greater care the accident would not have occurred.
