Island Net Stars Spring Surprise

Stewart And Gass Defeat Rennie, Toronto And Sharpe, Ottawa In Torrid Five Set Match In Yesterday's Championship Play - Upper Canadians As A Whole Show Great Form.

Upper Canadian players had things pretty much their own way in the men's singles event here yesterday in the P. E. I. tennis tournament. All the Nova Scotia players remaining in the singles were eliminated by Ottawa and Montreal stars. Harry Roper was the only Maritime player who gave his opponent much difficulty as he managed to take the third set from George LeClerc, of Ottawa, before admitting defeat. The scores were 6-1, 3-6, 6-1.

Commander J. C. Edwards, Ottawa, advanced to the semi-final round by beating his doubles partner A. C. Wiswell, of Halifax, 6-3, 7-5. Commander Edwards has yet to lose a set since arriving in the Maritimes. He played through the entire N. S. tourney at Halifax without once dropping a set and to all appearances will do likewise here. Laird Watt, of Montreal, had little trouble eliminating David Piers, Halifax, by scores of 6-4, 6-2, 7-5. While Charlie Peters, Montreal, took a three set triumph over LeRoy Rennie, 1931 Island champion, by scores of 6-3, 6-4, 7-5. The tennis in all four matches was good by the Upper Canadians had the edge over their Maritime opponents.

Alan Stewart and Don Gass, Charlottetown, sprang an upset in the men's doubles quarter finals by taking a torrid five set match from LeRoy Rennie, Toronto, and S. Sharpe, Ottawa. The Island players were behind two sets to one at the ten minute interval but came back strong after the third set to take the fourth and fifth and win the match amid great applause from the large gallery present. They are the only remaining Island team in the men's events and will now meet P. Piers and H. Roper in the semi-finals. They defeated Rennie and Sharpe by scores of 5-7, 6-4, 6-2, 7-5.

Pers and Roper, Nova Scotia champions took a straight set win from Laird Watt and Charlie Peters, Montreal, by scores of 6-3, 6-1, 6-4, while Eddie Condon and George LeClerc, Ottawa, defending champions, defeated Leo Burke and T. Thompson, Halifax, 6-4, 6-2, 6-4.

Cliff Edwards, Ottawa, and Cliff Wiswell, Halifax, trimmed G. Houston and G. White, local team, 6-1, 6-4, 6-3.

In the women's events Miss J. Dugal, Quebec, captured the first set from Mrs. F. V. Woodbury, Halifax, but could not stand the pace and dropped the next two 6-3, 6-1. Miss P. Rykert and Mrs. H. Beer, both of Ottawa, advanced to the semi-finals by beating Miss R. Bourke, Island champion, and Miss M. Henderson, Saint John, respectively by scores of 6-1, 6-1, and 6-1, 6-3.

Miss Isabel and Edith Macneill, of Halifax, scored a straight set win over the strong Island combination of Miss Eleanor Bourke and Mrs. G. Wood in the women's doubles by scores of 6-4, 6-1, while Mrs. H. Beer and Miss P. Rykert, Ottawa, went into the semi-finals by beating the Halifax team of Mrs. T. Thompson and Miss M. Lucas 6-3, 6-1.

THE DOMINION RIFLE SHOOT

CONNAUGHT RANGES, Ottawa Aug 11—(By The Canadian Press) —The province of Ontario represented by eight leading shots at the Dominion Rifle Association meet today won the London merchants cup, a provincial competition fired at 900 and 1,000 yards, scoring two points more than the Alberta team. The match created wide interest, and a large gallery followed the various teams.

The winning squad was Lt. Col. G. W. G. Gibson, Hamilton, with 87 out of a possible 100; Capt. H. W. Bishop, Ottawa, 83; Capt. J. T. Steel, Quebec, 80; Lt. R. Storr, Toronto, 96; Lt. G. E. Matchett, Hamilton, 93; C. S. M., W. A. Hawkins, Toronto, 93; C. S. M., N. J. McLeod, Toronto 87, and Sgt. J. H. Gray, Toronto, 93.

The Ontario total was 722 as compared with 720 for Alberta. British Columbia had 719; New Brunswick 719; Quebec 705; Saskatchewan 689; Nova Scotia 684; Prince Edward Island 673 and Manitoba 655.

Canadian Eight In Finals Today Hamilton Crew Had Easy Time Winning Semi-Final In Rowing Race. Two Canuck Crews Qualify (By Elmer Dulmage Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONG BEACH, Cal., Aug. 11.—Leanders of Hamilton, fighting giants who function under Bob Hunter's direction as Canada's Olympic eight-oared crew, late today drove their long, slender shell into the final for the Olympic Games championship.

Beaten yesterday by the Golden Bears of California, Leaders came back with a spectacular performance to whip Germany and Japan today with pull up beside the United States, Italy and Great Britain. Crews from these four countries row over the 2,000-metre course here Saturday to decide Olympic supremacy.

Leaders made comparatively slow time through waters blown almost choppy by a strong north wind, but the Hamilton oarsmen were not forced to raise their stroke, easily moving ahead of Germany and Japan with long, sweeping blade work that was perfection—different sort of perfection than the Hunter crew customarily achieves.

There was no need to put on steam to beat today's opposition. Leaders were two lengths in front of Germany at the finish, with the Japanese boat well back. Time of the winners was seven minutes 3 1-5 seconds.

The eight scored the lone Canadian victory today, two other entries fighting for places being beaten for the second time and eliminated.

Wright Eliminated Joe Wright, Jr., Toronto singles sculler, was third to Bill Miller, of the United States and Guillermo Douglas of Uruguay, losing his last chance to get into the finals with Bob Pearce and Dick Southwood. Halifax Micmacs, in the four-without-coxswain class, were third to Germany and the United States.

Besides the Leander eight, Ned Pratt and Noel De Mille, Vancouver doubles scullers, will carry Canada's standard into the rowing finals. They qualified yesterday by easily winning their preliminary heat.

A Thrilling Race Miller never was seriously threatened for first place, taking the lead shortly after the start and protecting it with ease. But Douglas and Wright provided a thrilling

duel to within 500 metres of the finish, when Joe cracked. He steered an erratic course as Douglas sped away to come in behind Miller.

Germany and the United States combined to beat the gallant four-oared crew from Halifax and eliminated the Bluenose Micmacs after a terrific struggle down the course that was decided in the final 100 metres. The three boats finished side by side, with Germany a quarter length in front and the United States about half a length ahead of the Canadian shell.

The race was one of the most thrilling of the olympics to date. The German oarsmen pulled a slow stroke over the entire distance, but they got a better run on the boat than the sprinting Americans or the smooth-stroking Mic Macs. At 1,000 metres the Germans were three-quarters of a length ahead, with Canada and United States even.

But the Canadians, visibly tired after they had passed the 1,500-metre post, fought more on nerve than anything else. The Germans kept slightly ahead, with the United States a few feet behind. As the boats shot past the grandstand the Canadians put on a spectacular finish.

The dying rally was short-lived, however, and the Micmacs could not keep their stroke up to the finish. Germany rowed the distance in 7:17 1-5, United States in 7:18 1-5 and Canada in 7:30 1-5.

The 214 Trot, No. 7 on the program of races offered by the Provincial Exhibition Association for Exhibition week, August 23rd to 25th, failed to obtain a satisfactory number of entries and has been declared off and replaced by a 215 Trot. The same purse and conditions as in the 214 Trot will prevail.

The 225 Trot and Pace, No. 6 on the program open to trotters and pacers which have not taken a record of 2:16 or better in a race, obtained a large entry list which would probably make necessary elimination heats, so we have decided to open another class, No. 10, namely a 225 Pace open to pacers who have not taken a record of 2:16 or better in a race, purse \$400

with the same entrance fee and deductions as the 225 Trot and Pace. All pacers who were properly entered in No. 6, the 225 Trot and Pace, will be drawn out in lots by a committee of horsemen and divided between No. 6 and No. 10, according as drawn and further entries will be accepted for No. 10 up to noon, Saturday, August 13th.
