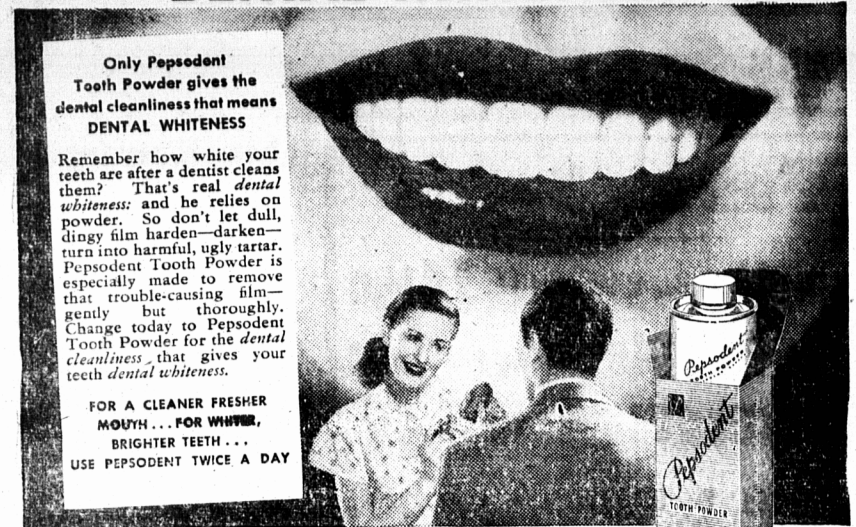

One-Act Play Program Delightful

One of the most outstanding theatrical performances to be seen in Victoria for many a long night, thrilled and delighted a sold-out house at the Victoria Little Theatre last evening, when the St. Barnabas Players, under the direction of Margot Gordon, presented three one-act plays. The program opened with a gay little drawing-room comedy, "A Cup of Tea," by Florence Ryer-

son. Robin Terry was excellent as a somewhat frustrated poet, given to writing sonnets to pretty ladies. Elsie Watson, as "Jane Wendall," his wife, calmed an irate husband, come to shoot the poet, by offering him a soothing cup of tea. Alan Chalmers, as "John Waring," the irate husband, and his wife "Azalea," played by Dorothy Groom were both good. The play was well-cast and moved at a good pace throughout.

Highlight of the evening was "The Duchess Says Her Prayers" by Mary Cass Canfield, in which Anna Wootton as "Cecilia Galerini," the beautiful mistress of the powerful "Duke Ludovico Sforza" gave an outstandingly moving interpretation of a very difficult role. Miss Wootton (who is a granddaughter of Mrs. George E. Goff, Charlottetown, whom she visited several years ago), is to be heartily congratulated upon her most effective use of voice and control of gesture and movement. As she stood in the niche, portraying the "Madonna," her relaxed but perfectly still attitude was a joy to watch. Ronald Wilson as the Italian nobleman, the "Duke Sforza," was very good, particularly in the last scene when he is persuaded that for his ultimate happiness lies with his child wife, the dainty, gay little "Beatrice d'Este," played by Mary Butters. She was excellent, particularly in her prayer to the Madonna. Again came the most satisfying sense of timing, and mature interpretation remarkable in so young a group. A period comedy, played with a

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broader of gesture that in itself was lovely, completed the program. It was "Petticoats Preferred" by T. B. Morris, in which Anna Wootton was seen in a completely contrasted part, as was Mary Butters. Both these talented young people showed marked ability and versatility. Others in the cast, all of whom were very pleasing, were Kathleen Foster, Joan Norman, Marguerite Watson, and Gwen Downes, who is always a delight.
Mrs. Downes as "Madame X" gave some character sketches which vastly amused her audience with topical allusions, and Miss Jean Harness, accompanied by Miss Pamela Terry, sang two soprano solos.
Mrs. Donald MacAulie, president of the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Children's Aid Society, under whose auspices the evening was arranged, is to be heartily congratulated, and Miss Margot Gordon who directed the plays, together with her aides backstage achieved an outstandingly successful performance.

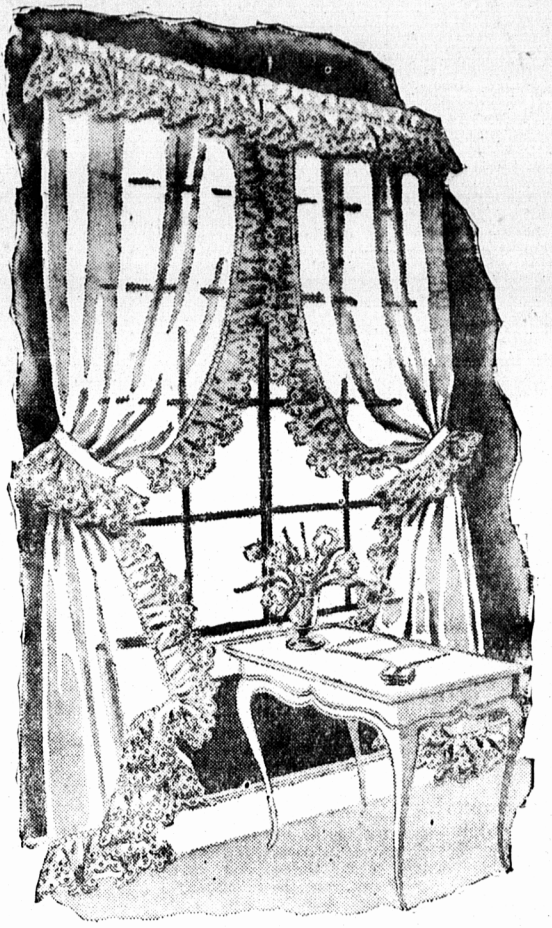

Mobile Ex-Ray Ready For Work

The Tuberculosis League placed the Mobile X-Ray Unit on display in the Market Square Tuesday morning. This unit has undergone extensive alterations during the winter to enable X-rays to be taken inside the van and thus save labor and expense. It is expected that the unit can be made operational within 10 minutes of the time that it is parked at any centre. This is an improvement because it used to be necessary to move all the equipment into some hall and assemble it before commencing work. Now the inside of the van has been made into a single room and the equipment permanently mounted along one side. Fluorescent fixtures overhead provide adequate lighting and two combination fans and heaters are expected to keep the interior comfortable at all seasons.
The electric power unit which was previously carried in the van is now mounted in a trailer which was acquired from War Assets. Both van and trailer have been freshly painted and present a pleasing appearance.
All alterations were made according to specifications furnished by the Victor X-ray Corporation. Their representative recently inspected the completed job and gave it as his opinion that the cost of these operations was very reasonable and that the new unit should be more efficient than the old.
This modernized unit will be brought to almost every district in the part of Kings county which has not yet been surveyed. As many as three school districts will be visited daily and the unit parked along side the hall where the people assemble. A clerk from the unit assisted by volunteers from the district will write down necessary details and then send the people to the van where they will be X-rayed through their ordinary clothing. The technician in the van will be able to talk to the workers in the hall through a special inter-communication unit built by one of the unit staff, so that the people can be done in an orderly fashion.
Later in the season the unit will be stationed for one day at a time at various centres throughout the province, and everybody who wishes an X-ray will be able to attend one or other of these centres without travelling too far.

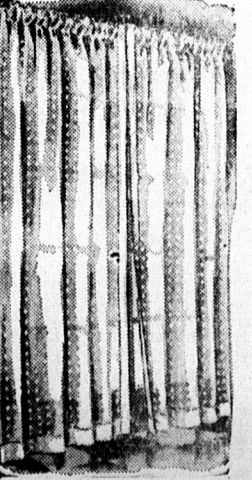
