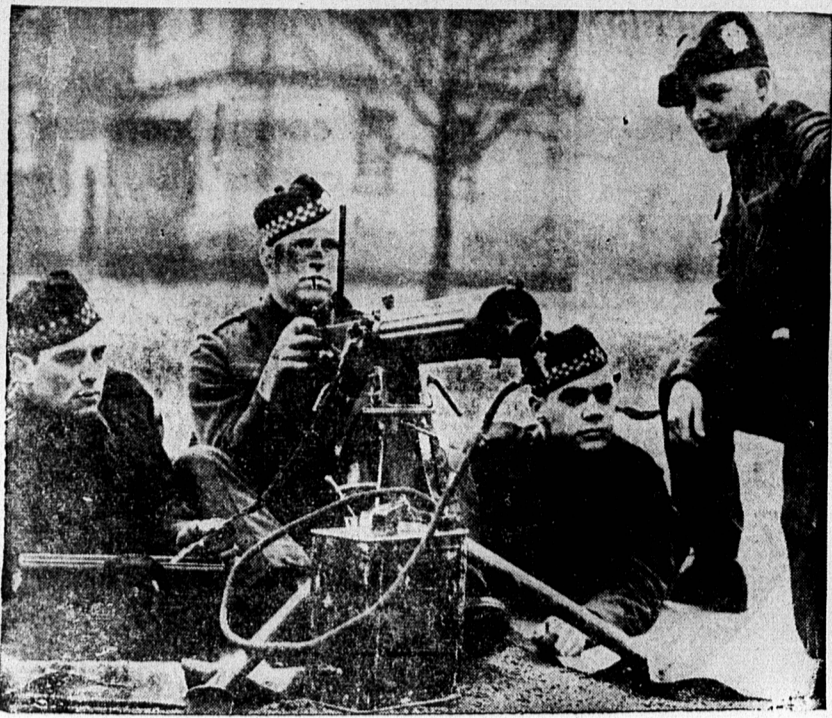


Toronto Scots At Machine Gun Practice

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE

Legislative Assembly, April 24th, 1940. When the House opened at 3.15 p. m., Hon. Dr. MacMillan called the attention of Premier Campbell to a question regarding the payment of \$100. to the Acting Minister of Agriculture, and also a question concerning the detailed expenses of the Royal Visit and the Confederation Celebration.

Premier Campbell tabled the answers to these questions and they are to be found at the end of this article. Mr. McPhee drew the attention of the Attorney General, Hon. T. A. Campbell, to a question about an item appearing in the Public Accounts regarding Crown Prosecution expenses \$2,401.00.

The answer was tabled and appears at the end of this article. Mr. Stewart asked the Attorney General for the answer to a question regarding the purchase of liquor by the Government for the year 1939, the receipts from sale of such and also the legal expenses in connection with the item along with the expense in connection with the enforcement of the Prohibition Act.

The Attorney General tabled the answers to these questions and they appear below. Hon. Mr. Dennis tabled the answer to a question regarding freight on hay to the amount of hay which had appeared in the Public Accounts.

Mr. McLean drew the attention of the Premier to a question about an item in connection with the expenditure of \$8,139.59 for New York's World's Fair, which appeared in the Public Accounts. Premier Campbell said that he had overlooked the question but would endeavor to have the answer tomorrow (Thursday).

Mr. McLean asked Hon. Mr. Cox, chairman of the Fishermen's Loan Board, about a question regarding fish curing plants.

Hon. Mr. Cox tabled the answers which appear at the end of the article. Mr. McLean asked Hon. Mr. McIntyre about a question regarding the purchasing of meat for Falconwood Farm, Queen's County Jail and the Provincial Infirmary.

Hon. Mr. McIntyre referred Mr. McLean to page 119 of the Public Works Report for the answer. He also explained that several carcasses are bought from different parties and sent to Falconwood farm where they are cut up and some is sent to the jail.

Montague Incorporation Act. Mr. Baker referred to the statement of a former member who claimed that the Incorporation Act of Montague was dead. He inquired if this amendment would be retroactive. "It is seldom retroactive legislation," he added.

Mr. McPhee explained that in 1939 that the town had passed a by-law and parts were assessed and all that the present amendment was doing was asking for authority.

Mr. Barbour, referring to the amendment seeking power to impound cars for non payment of taxes, said that it was just as well to have this law uniform throughout the Province. He was not in favor of it, however, and said that the storage of any cars seized would cost \$2. or \$3. a week. "It will be costly to the man who does not pay his taxes," he added.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment. The House went into committee on "An Act to Amend an Act to Incorporate the Town of Georgetown," with Mr. Barbour in the chair.

An Act to Amend an Act to Consolidate and Amend the Prince Edward Island Dental Act. was referred back to committee with Mr. Stewart in the chair.

Non-Resident Dentists. Mr. Dennis was not in favor with a clause in the act which provided that non-resident dentists would be required to pay the sum of \$400 before being allowed to practice in the Province.

Change in County Court Circuits

The following amendment to the Act was provided: Two circuits of Queen's County, one to be held at or near Clifton Lot 21, on the third Tuesday in August, October, December and March, to be known as the fifth circuit. The other to be held at Charlottetown, on the fourth Tuesday in August, October, December, and March, to be known as the sixth circuit.

Two circuits in Prince County, one to be held at Alberton on the first Tuesday in June, October, December and March, to be known as the first circuit. Another to be held at Summerside on the third Tuesday in June, September, December and March, to be known as the fifth circuit.

In Kings County there will be four circuits. The first circuit will be held at or near Souris, Lot 45, on the first Tuesday in March, August, October and December. The second circuit to be held at or near the head of St. Peter's Bay, Lot 41, on the Thursday following the first Tuesday in March, August, October and December.

The fourth circuit to be held at or near the Head of Murray River, Lot 63 or 64, as may be deemed most convenient on the second Tuesday in March, August, October and December. The fifth circuit to be held at Georgetown on the third Tuesday in March, August, October and December.

These sections to come into effect on the 1st day of January, 1941. Mr. McPhee said that while there is little work in some of the circuits at present, nevertheless the County Courts were established as a people's Court and the amendments are calculated to save time and expense for the Judges. The change may cause inconvenience to the people.

Premier Campbell said that some of the local circuits have fallen into disuse and cited the case of Grand River circuit where the revenue in 1938 was fifty cents and in 1939 nothing. There was one case in two years which meant that the Government had received a revenue of fifty cents for an expenditure of \$200. The same was true of some of the other circuits and the change would mean a saving to the department, he explained.

Mr. Mustard maintained that the centre of Dundas, an old established circuit, should not be discontinued. It was better located than St. Peter's and should be given some consideration, he added.

The House went into committee on "An Act Respecting Bacterial Rot," with Mr. Hughes in the chair. The following took part in a discussion of the Act: Mr. Saville, Mr. McPhee, Mr. Baker, Hon. Mr. Dennis, Hon. Dr. MacMillan, Hon. Mr. McGuigan, Hon. Mr. Wright and Mr. Mustard. Progress was reported on the bill.

The House went into committee on "An Act to Make Uniform the Law Respecting Deductions Made on the Purchase of Cattle with Horns," with Mr. McLean in the chair.

The following took part in a discussion of the Act: Mr. McLean, Hon. Mr. Cox, Mr. Saville and Mr. Hughes. Progress was reported on the bill.

The House went into committee on "An Act Respecting the Court of Chancery" with Mr. Barbour in the chair. It was reported agreed to with amendment.

At 6 o'clock the House adjourned until 8 p. m.

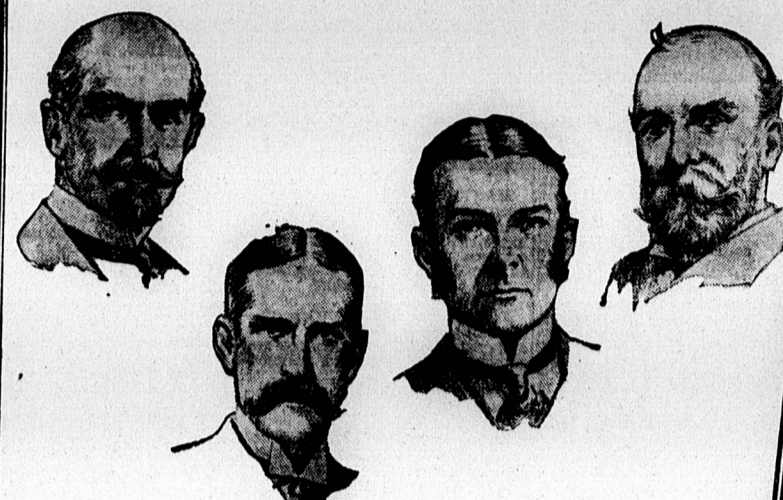
