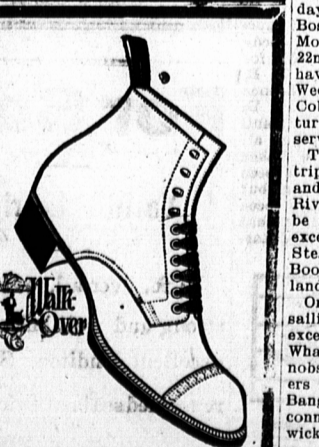

Rev. William B. Bradshaw died at his home at Whittier, Calif. on May 31st. Death was caused by cancer of the stomach. He had been ill about one year. Mr. Bradshaw was born in Central Bedegwa, Prince Edward Island, July 19, 1847. He took the degrees of A. B. and A. M. at Acadia university in Nova Scotia, and was ordained to the ministry at North River in 1864. That year he was married to Miss Mary McKinley. His first pastorate was at Pignish, where he was instrumental in building two churches and thence he went to Petersburg, Va. Following this he was pastor of the historic church of Cornwallis and Annapolis Valleys. He was later pastor at Hiawatha and Hutchinson, Kas., where he also built two churches. He took his Ph. D. in 1888 and came to Whittier in 1907 and was pastor of the Whittier Baptist church until his health failed. Surviving Mr. Bradshaw are Mrs. Bradshaw, Miss Blanche Bradshaw, teacher in the Redondo high school; Miss Alexandria Bradshaw, recent graduate of the Los Angeles state normal school, and Frank Bradshaw, a farmer in Alberta, Canada. Mr. Bradshaw was considered one of the prominent Baptist pastors of Southern California and will be greatly missed.

EASTERN STEAMSHIP EXCURSIONS.

June, the month of roses, really signifies the beginning of the vacation season, and all roads now apparently lead to the country, mountain or seashore. The Eastern Steamship Company is receiving its full quota of vacation travel, and in fact is doing a larger passenger traffic now than ever before at this period. On the Portland Division which all summer long does an immense business, the steamships Governor Dingley and Bay State are carrying already a very large passenger list, and patronage shows steady increase a week from today the first of the Sunday trips between Boston and Portland will be in order and that means the inauguration on this division of the usual seven day trips, a steamer leaving Boston and Portland every evening at 7 p.m. There is another trip from Boston to Portland, that on the International Division, which is supremely popular. It is the daylight trip of the Calvin Austin which leaves Boston (Union Wharf) every Monday and Friday at 9 a.m. One the Monday trip out of Boston the Calvin makes landings at Portland, Eastport, Lubec and St. John, but does not stop at Portland on Friday's trip. Direct service between Boston and St. John will begin on Monday, June 22nd, and on June 22nd, the International Division will have three trips a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday, the Governor Cobb and Camden, both express turbine steamships performing that service. The Kennebec Division has three trips a week Monday, Wednesday and Friday, for Bath and Kennebec River landings and this service will be increased to daily trips (Sundays excepted) on Friday, June 26th. Steamers on this arm connect for Boothbay Harbor and intermediate landings. On the Bangor Division there are sailings now every evening (Sundays excepted) at 5 p.m. from Foster's Wharf, for Rockland, Bangor, Penobscot and Bay points. The steamers City Rockland and City of Bangor are in commission, and make connections at Rockland for, Sedgwick, Bluehill and Bar Harbor.

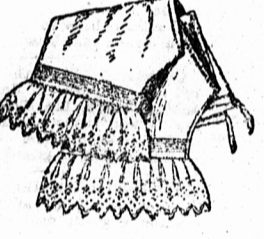

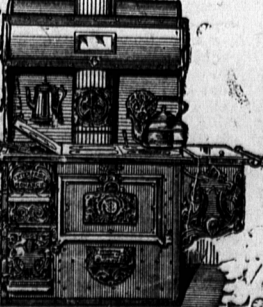
