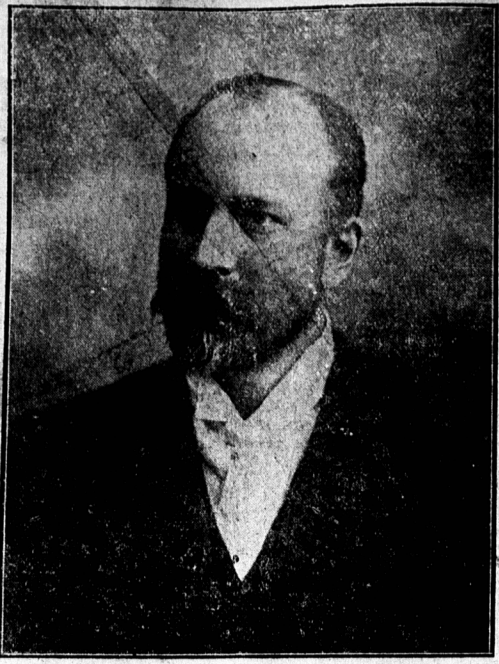

BIG QUESTION OVER ASIATICS

VANCOUVER, B. C. Sept. 21.—The supreme question that concerns labor "Are Asiatics to be let in?" Two thousand Hindoos have come in this year. They are working all over the vicinity of Vancouver clearing trees off new town lots and doing navy work, etc. All wear turbans of yellow, blue or red. The Japanese are working in the lumber mills and make good hands. Fifteen hundred Japs with lanterns will turn out Tuesday. Three Asiatic races are here and an effort is to be made to get in more. The Grand Trunk Pacific say they must get Chinese to build the road and are presenting Premier Laurier to suspend the \$300 head tax. Other big concerns are doing the same thing but the Dominion Trades and Labor convention have declared against Asiatics and for the increase of the head tax to \$1,000. In the meantime every Asiatic has to work and hundreds of young Chinese are making the passage without paying a tax. No tax is collected and how do they get it is a question.

GRAND TRACADIE FREE LIBRARY

The annual meeting of the Grand Tracadie Free Circulating Library was held in the library building on September 19th. The president, N. J. McDonald in the chair. In a few well-chosen words he reviewed the good work done by the institution during the past year and the opportunities afforded its members both socially and educationally, ending his remarks by an earnest appeal to each member to further the good work and grasp the opportunities afforded them through its influence.

Then followed the Treasurer's report showing that the expenditure amounted to \$183.70 and the receipts which were made up principally by entertainments, and donations, amounted to \$113.37, together with \$102.50 on hand at last general meeting, leaving a balance now on hand of \$32.17. Following is the Librarian's report in substance.

I am pleased to report that the progress during the year has been satisfactory. A large number attended the institution, especially during the winter months, and availed themselves of the social and literary advantages to be enjoyed there. The total number of borrowers during the year was 122 and the number of books loaned 702. A number of shelves had to be added to make room for the increasing number of books. Following the arrival of Miss Cornelia B. Lawson of Yonkers, N. Y., the foundress and untiring friend of the Library, who arrived in August, bringing with her a large box of new books, a large donation of books was also received from Mrs. (Gen.) Orr of Rockway, Ohio, bringing the number of books on the shelves up to 802. A number of paper-covered books were withdrawn from circulation to make room for the new ones. A number were also lost in the burning of the Hotel Acadia. All things considered we have reason to be satisfied with the progress of the library. Starting originally in a dilapidated building, with 300 books, we have at the end of two years quite a comfortable building, completely shingled and finished in every way on the outside and a coat of paint now being added which gives it the cosy look outside that it feels within. The little lot that the building stands on has also been purchased by the Company and encircled by a neat fence, which adds much to its appearance. Altogether we have a very comfortable building with almost everything necessary to conduct the business of the Library. Now that the number of books has increased to 800 let us hope the people will appreciate the opportunities afforded and take full advantage of them, especially the younger ones, and not confine their reading exclusively to fiction, but make use of the educational works that are found on the shelves, thereby laying a foundation of knowledge by which they may be able in after years to look back with pride to the early teachings of the Library.

The following officers were then appointed: Frank McDonald, Librarian; H. R. McDonald, (reappointed) Sec. Treas. Mrs. J. W. McDonald, Mrs. Joseph Forsyth, James McNab, John A. Martin, Mary E. McDonald, Committee.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Gen. Orr for the books contributed and to G. D. Longworth for the paint supplied for the building; also to A. A. McLean, M. P., for books and literature and to Alex. Martin, M. P. for a generous donation toward the library funds. The meeting then adjourned.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 16, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the certificate as residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.
