

THE SEED FAIR.

A Large Attendance and Excellent Exhibits Yesterday—The Prize List.

Notwithstanding disagreeable weather, bad roads and other drawbacks the Provincial Seed Fair held in Horne's Building, Charlottetown, far exceeded the expectations of the promoters. There were entries from many sections of the Island and in all were nearly one hundred from over fifty exhibitors. The entries included excellent samples of oats, wheat, barley, buckwheat and potatoes.

The fair was opened at two o'clock by Lieutenant Governor McIntyre. He referred to the advance made in agriculture in Prince Edward Island, and to the improved system adopted whereby the fertility of the soil was kept on the land instead of being shipped away. The Government are to be commended for the excellent idea in holding the seed show and thus further promoting agriculture.

Among the other speakers were The Commissioner of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Rogers, Anthony McLaughlin, M. L. A., Walter Simpson, Peter Brodie, G. C. Gardiner, D. P. Irving, M. L. A., and others.

D. P. IRVING, M. L. A., thought this a move in the right direction and said it speaks a growing interest. Good seeding is of the first importance; it is at the very foundation of profitable agriculture. No farmer who wishes to live by his calling can afford to ignore it. What we sow we reap ever holds true. Every effort to encourage the growing and importation of pure seed and the suppression of noxious weeds should and will meet with general approval.

George W. Simpson, M. L. A. said that while it is possible for the Government to assist by appointing an inspector, the farmers must take a good deal of blame themselves, because they have been after the cheap seeds. He referred to the work in testing, etc. done by the Agricultural Department at Ottawa. Much information can be obtained from the bulletins and charts issued by the Department.

G. E. Clarke, chief of the seed division expressed his surprise at seeing such a large attendance with such unfavorable weather. He congratulated the exhibitors on their excellent samples. There is no other province except British Columbia that can produce such plump, full seed. The wheat shown today will compare favorably with that sold in any place in the Dominion. He would strongly advise Prince Edward Island farmers to grow their own seed and not trust to importations. If the seed fair is carried on for a few years the trend of seed would be from the Island to the west instead of from the west to here. He referred to the Sir William McDonald seed grain competition. There are in Prince Edward Island over 100 farmers that have improved their seed by careful selection from the largest seeds since 1900. By this method pedigree seed has been established. It is proper for each farmer who has a highly conditioned farm to be encouraged to grow seed which can be sold as pedigree seed. He trusted farmers
