QUEEN'S CANADIAN FUND DONATIONS FOR AIR RAID VICTIMS

HANDSOME DONATION OF \$80.50 RECEIVED FROM OFFICERS AND MEN OF THE R. C. N. V. R., CHARLOTTETOWN DIVISION.

Repeated bombing raids on British port areas and the industrial midlands has attracted fresh attention to the plight of the many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are barred out from shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places found for them all, places of relative security, but the belongings of all kinds are destroyed, the task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult. To meet these enormous needs, funds have been started in various parts of the world. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth has permitted the use of her name in connection with the Dominion campaign, which is officially known as "The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims."

Baby Loses Speech and Hearing In Air Raid

The pathetic story of a child who lost her speech and hearing as the result of an air raid is told in a letter printed in the Halifax Herald. This tragedy of a little girl of two years old whose father is serving with the Army of the Middle East is one of the many that come from the stricken areas of Great Britain to whose homeless victims the Queen's Canadian Fund is serving to give its aid. We print part of the letter as it was received from England: "The baby was just eight weeks old when his daddy went away in June. There were three others, the eldest being three years old. For the past eight months L. has had no tidings of him. Last year she was getting very much depressed so she stored her furniture and came to stay with us. "When the bombing grew worse we had to take the children to the shelter, the second youngest, Eileen, who was two, cried all night. We did not leave the shelter until 7 a. m. Eileen, who was always the brightest and liveliest of the group did not speak since that night. She has neither heard nor spoken a word. "Yesterday I got a car and took her out to Kathleen's where Eileen

is under the doctor's care. But there is no improvement. Oh, you have to experience it yourself before you can imagine how awful it is. Their work is murder, pure and simple. They did not bother about military machinery. They came down and machine-gunned the people in the streets; women and children have suffered terribly in Birmingham. "In our family I have seen seven children and their parents buried at the same time. One day I saw four sisters buried, they had been trapped in their cellar and drowned and that is not the first I can just imagine. Maureen's nukes, to go back into that. But they are all the same. "The children can't frighten the British. Every bomb that comes down makes them more determined to carry on."

1,453 AXIS PLANES DESTROYED LONDON, July 2--(CP)--British Empire air forces in the Middle East shot down or destroyed on the ground 1,453 Axis or Vichy planes during the first six months of 1941. The Air Ministry announced today. The Ministry said June operations were particularly successful. Empire fliers having destroyed 210 hostile planes, including 55 Vichy craft in Syria, with a loss of 65 British planes.

Whether it was the drum's beat behind the frontier stockade, or the silver voice of 1914 bugles, Canadians rallied instantly to the defence of their country. Whether it was the bells which roused Quebec City when de Salaberry's French-Canadians defeated the invader at Chateauguay in 1775, or the cannon's boom which told York of its peril in 1813, the result was the same. Whether it shocked or thrilled or angered, the CALL TO ARMS has not failed to inspire all loyal Canadians to stand to their arms in a concerted defence of freedom.
