### THE KING RAISES GEN. WHITE TO RANK OF FIELD MARCHAL

HEALTHY, April 8.—The King landed here from the royal yacht Victoria and Albert to-day. His Majesty was received by the Governor and by the naval and military staffs, while royal salutes were fired. A procession was formed and the King drove through the streets, which were lined with soldiers and demonstrating crowds.

King Edward was present to-night at a state banquet given by Sir George Stuart White, the Governor of Gibraltar and the defender of Ladysmith during the South African war. During the banquet the King announced that he had promoted Sir George White to the rank of Field Marshal.

### RIOT ON BORDER ENDS IN MURDER

Strikers Who Lived in Detroit Make an Assault

Upon Workmen who Reside in Walkerville, Ont. and one of Their Number is Killed as a Result of the Quarrel.

WALKERVILLE, Ont., April 9.—(Special to the World.)—Labor trouble led this afternoon to a riot, in which one man was killed and another may die. In addition fully ten others received wounds of a more or less serious character, and several of them are under the care of physicians.

M. J. Sullivan, a strike sympathizer, was shot and killed in the struggle by George Kennedy, an officer of the company.

On April 1 the 270 employees of the bridge company, most of whom reside in Detroit and cross the river daily to their work, struck for an increase in wages. The company denied the demand and the men walked out. Non-union men were secured to take the places of most of the strikers, and a large force of police has been necessary about the plant of the company ever since the strike, to ensure order and guard the workmen to the ferry boat at the close of each day's work.

#### USED THEIR REVOLVERS.

This afternoon just before the close of the working day about 40 strikers, with a number of union sympathizers, the employees of the Buhl Malleable Iron Co. of Detroit, gathered about the works of the Canadian coarser. The non-union men were hooted as they emerged from the building, and were followed to the ferry, the entire party crossing the river on the same boat. On the Detroit side, about 15 of the non-union men, five of whom were armed with revolvers, left the boat, and these were immediately assailed by the strikers. Two thousand people witnessed the desperate struggle of the men, attracted by reports that a fight was imminent.

#### USED AN IRON BAR.

Gustave Adams, another of the workmen, had armed himself before leaving the Bridge Works, with a heavy iron bolt. When the melee began, he pressed to the outer edge of the crowd, and, when attacked by Steven Laduke, one of the strikers, he slipped the bolt out of his sleeve, and dealt Laduke a blow over the head, which stunned him. He is still in a comatose condition and may die.

#### ARRESTS TWENTY RIOTERS.

But one policeman (John E. Kline) was on duty at the scene of the riot, and he managed to arrest five men belonging to the attacking party before the arrival of reinforcements. The lobby of a neighboring hotel was then converted into an extemporaneous prison, and over 20 of the contestants were rounded up. All of them were released later in the evening, however, with the exception of Kennedy and Adams.

#### FIELD OF STRUGGLING MEN.

The scene of the riot was immediately in front of the big drug factory of Parke, Davis & Co., and the employees, to the number of over 2000, had just left work, and were spectators of the scene. A large open field was at one time fairly covered with the struggling combatants.

#### CAUSE OF THE STRIKE.

The strike began last Monday morning, with a disagreement over wages and a ten-hour day. Since that time, the strikers have done everything in their power to induce outsiders to keep away, and, in a measure, they have been successful. Not until to-night has there been any marked violence. At midnight all was quite around the millitiamen, who have been enrolled as Bridge Works here, but a member of special police, and doing patrol duty. No further violence is apprehended at present as the works will remain shut down until next Monday morning, by which time it is hoped an arrangement will have been arrived at between the strikers and their employers.
