PROPERTY BEQUEATHED.—The will of the late Hon. Lemuel Cambridge Owen, Charlottetown, dated May, 1903, was given for probate Nov. 30, 1912. According to the inventory the estate is valued at \$22,652.00 and is to be divided between his two sons, William Edgar Wallace Owen, Kippooch, and Leonard Cambridge Owen, (Jr.), Toronto, also \$300 to his niece Elsie Owen McGowan, Moncton, W. E. Owen, Kippooch, is sole executor and A. E. MacDonald, Charlottetown, is proctor.

VALUABLE DOG ESCAPES.—A collie dog arrived in Charlottetown yesterday by the Murray Harbor train and as the owner did not meet him, he was tied up in the baggage room. After surveying the surroundings for a time, the dog decided to make a dash for liberty, and as his head was either very small or his neck very large, easily slipped his collar off and notwithstanding the efforts put forth at the railway station gained his liberty. No doubt, he is being welcomed home as this. The purchaser arrived in time to see the collar and a few hairs attached there to and was informed that the freightage must be paid before the collar could be given up. The owner is rather downcast over the proceedings as the dog is a very valuable one.

AN EXCELLENT SHOWING.—John Hancock, of Wood Islands, North, although the owner of a farm of nearly two hundred acres, believes in the profitability of the small farm. As an experiment, he last spring set apart eight acres of his farm for intensive cultivation. His crop of this piece of land was as follows:—Strawberries, \$125; 320 bus. carrots at 40c., \$128; 30 bus. peas at 80c., \$24; 15 bus. beans 60c., \$9; 300 cabbage at 4c., \$12; 450 lbs. onions at 3c., \$13.50; 260 bus. turnips at 20c., \$52; 5 tons hay at \$13.65; 12 bus. wheat \$9.60; 450 bus. potatoes at 25c., \$112.50. Total \$574.60. In addition to this he grew a quantity of corn of which no account was taken, supplied the family with vegetables during the summer and sold some of which he kept no reckoning. He also fed two horses and two cows with green feed grown on an eighth of an acre of this plot and threshed 10 bushels of grain from the ripened feed. This is a convincing record of the value of intensive farming and Mr. Hancock purposes following the same course next year.

NOTES ON THE NEW BLOUSES. Considerable use continues to be made of the chiffon-veiled blouse. Nothing has been found to bring the soft bodice into harmony with the skirt quite so well as veiling it with a chiffon of matching color. There is still considerable vogue for the peplum or basque effect on the separate blouse. Very many of the new models are distinguished from those of last year by the full-length sleeves. The new idea in the sleeves of chiffon blouses is to have, first, a foundation sleeve, skin tight, made of transparent chiffon, and over this a small bishop sleeve, brought in to a medium-wide cuff, fitting close about the wrist. Usually this cuff is not transparent, but is developed in satin or soft similar material. Quite a fancy prevails for brilliant colors in cuffs, these sometimes adding the one strong color note. These cuffs then appear more like wristlets than cuffs. Another feature in blouses is the very general use of the large simulated buttonhole bound in color, on great deal of work is put in on some of the models, two or three tiny pipings, together with embroidery trimming the buttonholes. As a further novelty, pear-shaped drop buttons or ornaments hang from these buttonhole slashes. It is quite a pretty fashion and a novelty. Another trimming feature is small tassels ornaments which fall from embroidered centres—discs, ovals squares, oblongs or diamond-shaped ornaments of braid or embroidery.

THE DEEPEST DEPTH. According to the "Geographical Journal," a depth surpassing all previous records has been sounded by the German survey-ship Plunder, 40 nautical miles east of Northern Mindanao. The depth obtained was 9780 metres, or 5348 fathoms, and the sounding was obtained under conditions which permit the fullest confidence in its accuracy, while a determination of bottom temperature and a sample of the sea-bottom at the spot were also secured. The greatest depth previously known was that found by the American ship Nero near Guam in 1849, which was fixed at 5268 fathoms. This has now been exceeded, therefore, by 80 fathoms.

HUNTING WITH AEROPLANES. Hunting of game by aeroplane is likely to become one of the sports of the future, and in France several of the pilots are becoming adepts at this kind of chase. Moreau is one of these, but he lately met with an accident, which, however, is not very serious. He had been invited by the Mayor of Varennes, near Paris, to take part in the opening of the fall hunting season, and was flying near the ground when a shot fired by an imprudent hunter struck him in the eye. But he was soon able to make a landing and received medical aid at once, so that probably he will not be laid up for more than two weeks.

CHURCH HEATED WITH ELECTRICITY. A successful instance of electric heating for a large church is seen in the St. Sebaldus Church at Nuremberg. Individual heaters are used in each pew so that a good distribution of heat results. This is done by mounting a long tube heater near the back of the following pew, which acts as a foot-warmer. The electric heating tube is a 3-inch iron pipe which contains a smaller tube wound with resistance wire. At each pew is a switch for cutting out the heater, and all the separate wires from the heaters run to connection boxes placed at different points under the floor. A perforated iron foot-rest runs along above each heater. The church has a seating capacity of 1200, and the length of pews is 1750 feet in all.

GRAFTING HUMAN ORGANS. In a paper on "Thanatology," Dr. Rowell Park tells how the newest miracle may be accomplished. His plan simply is to make practical use of the live organs that remain in the corpse of a man or woman. Since death may result from violent injury to one organ, the brain or the heart, for instance—Dr. Park says that the remaining live tissues may be grafted on the body of an injured person with the same hope of success that Burbank exhibits in grafting the flora. In this manner virtually every part of a body, with the exception of the diseased part, may be used with good effect by practical surgeons. Teeth, bone, flesh, and muscle, he says, may be used in carrying health and renewed life to at least 50 patients by the use of only one body. Countless operations hitherto looked upon as impossible are declared possible in this way.

EDUCATION OF ROYAL PRINCES. The early part of next year will see a considerable change in the education of two of the royal princes, Prince Albert and Prince Henry. Prince Albert will pass out from the senior division of the Royal Naval College at Dartmouth at Christmas, and Prince Henry will then complete his studies at St. Peter's Court School, near Broadstairs.
