W. C. B. APPOINTMENTS - Messrs. Ross McEwen and Jerome Gillis, Charlottetown, have been appointed members of the Workmen's Compensation Board, of which Mr. Horace Wright, former member without portfolio in the Jones Government, was recently appointed chairman.

ORGANIZATION PLANS - Plans for the organization of a Young Progressive Conservative Association on a Province-wide basis are under way and a meeting in this connection will be held in Charlottetown shortly. It was announced over the weekend by Mr. Walthen Gaudet, Provincial press relations officer.

ISLAND RHODES SCHOLAR RETIRES - The alumni News of Dalhousie University reports that Mr. Everett Fraser, Arts 1907, Dalhousie, Dean of the Law School of the University of Minnesota since 1920, has retired from that position. From Prince of Wales College he went to Dalhousie, thence to Harvard, graduating in 1910. He then taught in George Washington University until 1917, going to the University of Minnesota in that year, and subsequently becoming Dean of the Law School. He has written extensively on legal subjects; was President of the American Association of Law Schools and has taken a leading part in legal education south of the border. Mrs. Fraser (Lola MacKay) is also a graduate of Dalhousie. Dr. Fraser is a native of North Lake in Kings County.

In an interview with The Guardian prior to his departure yesterday for Ottawa, Mr. J. Lester Douglas, Liberal M. P. for Queens, said he learned authoritatively that Dr. T. V. Grant, M. P. for King's, had informed a member of the Provincial Government by telephone from Ottawa that he (Dr. Grant) and Hon. G. H. Barbour, Minister of Public Works and Highways, were to be appointed to the two vacant Senate seats in Prince Edward Island.

"It is a most unusual procedure for an ordinary M. P. to make any announcement or intimation with regard to Senate appointments, which can only be properly made by the Prime Minister of Canada," Mr. Douglas declared. "This has always been the Prime Minister's prerogative, and it would appear that in the present case an effort is being made to force the Prime Minister's hand by a premature statement."

Mr. Douglas said he had it on the best authority that no appointments to the Senate would be made until after Parliament prorogues. With regard to his own claim to a Senatorship, Mr. Douglas said his political record spoke for itself. He had been an active supporter of the Liberal Party for thirty years, and since his election by acclamation to the House of Commons in 1938 had been returned at every election.

Architects are busy completing the plans for the new Federal Building in Charlottetown, and it is expected that tenders for the work will be called shortly. All the properties on the site, bounded by Queen, Richmond, Pownall and Sydney Streets, have been appraised and a number of tenants have already found premises elsewhere.

The new building will be a two-storey stone and steel structure, 330 feet long by 75 feet in width. It will be set back 80 feet from the Queen Street frontage with a space of 30 feet between the building and the other surrounding streets.

The Post Office, Unemployment Insurance and Tax offices will occupy the ground floor, and will be accommodated above for all the other Federal departments. The main entrance will face the corner of Queen and Richmond Streets. A special entrance for mail truck deliveries will be provided on Sydney Street. Ample provision is being made for parking space and other conveniences.

Although suffering from ill-health for the past several years, Mr. Nicholson was up and about as usual the day previous to his demise but a heart attack proved fatal. He passed away at the home of Mr. William Watts, with whom he had been residing for a number of years.

Well and favorably known throughout the Province, the deceased was one of the Island's keenest sportsmen. In addition to being a follower of athletics in his prime he was one of the best billiard shots ever developed here and in addition to holding provincial titles also represented the Province on one occasion at Montreal in a Canadian-wide competition.

Horse racing also was one of his favorite sports and his was a familiar figure at meets at which the trotters and pacers performed.

In latter years he took up curling and becoming quite adept at the game at the time of his death was a member of the Charlottetown Curling Club.

Prince Edward Island has a new Great Seal, which arrived recently for the Provincial Secretary's Office, and which will replace the Great Seal used since Queen Victoria's time on such important documents as proclamations, letters patent, commissions and various state documents.

The seal was manufactured at the Royal Mint at Ottawa and while it is the same size as its predecessor, the design is somewhat different. Instead of the Imperial coat of arms it has the crest of the Province, surrounded by the words: "Great Seal of the Province of Prince Edward Island."

Meanwhile, the existence of the Island's most noteworthy Great Seal still remains a mystery. It was stolen by American privateers when they raided Charlottetown in 1775, and every effort made to trace its whereabouts has been unsuccessful.

FORMER ISLAND LADY DIES IN SAINT JOHN - Mr. B. Graham Rogers received the sad news yesterday morning that his aunt, Mrs. Fred L. Rogers, had died suddenly in Saint John yesterday morning. She was about eighty years of age. She and her husband had lived many years in Alberton in this Province, where she was well known as a fox rancher. He managed a fox ranch for the Silver Fox Ranching Company, an American financed concern. Besides her husband, who was on a trip to the United States at the time of her sudden death, she leaves to mourn her passing two sons and one daughter. The sons are W. W. Rogers of Saint John, president of the S.M.T. (Eastern), and Hubert, who lives in Vermont. The daughter is Frances who is married in Cleveland. She was an aunt of the late Norman Rogers, who was Minister of National Defence for Canada when he was killed in a plane crash early in the war.

Mrs. Rogers was a noted pianist in her younger days and was well known throughout the Province. She will be buried in Saint John.

RETURNS FROM MEETING - Mr. Earl Ings of Mt. Herbert returned yesterday from Amherst, N.S. where he attended a meeting of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association on Wednesday. Mr. Ings who is senior vice-president, said the opinion of men at the meeting was that the proposed increase in freight rates on shipment of exhibition cattle would mean a decrease in the number of exhibits at the Maritime Winter Fair, unless there was a substantial increase in the prizes offered. Mr. Ings said the freight rate increase would mean it would cost \$70 to ship a carload of exhibition cattle to the Winter Fair, in place of the \$36 previously charged.

Due to the small representation from outlying districts, the organization of a co-operative by farmers in the vicinity of Charlottetown was postponed last evening until Monday at 8 p.m. at Birch Court.

Inclement weather and road conditions were blamed for the small attendance and some sixty farmers discussed the proposed organization at the Prince of Wales College auditorium. Smith MacFarlane, Brackley, was in the chair.

The chairman reviewed the progress of the movement. He believed it was too late this season to handle surplus milk as originally planned, but that it was not too late to sell feed. Mr. J.G. Dennis, secretary of the Co-operative Union of P.E.I. traced the development of the idea of a co-operative in the vicinity of Charlottetown. He stated that a number of farmers were found to be in the favor of a co-operative to handle feed, groceries and other farm equipment, and he was surprised by the numbers interested. The speaker felt that between ten and twenty thousand dollars would be required to be subscribed as share capital to make a start. He advocated the producers and consumers working together in this organization.

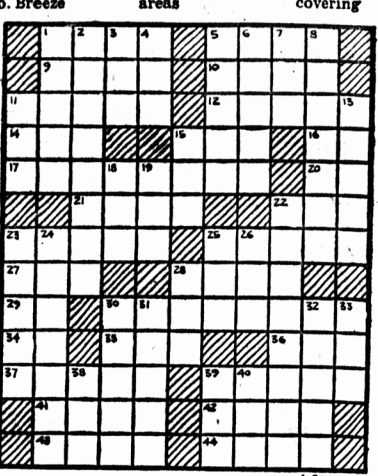
