WHILE the Duke of Cornwall and Royal party will not visit the city the Council have decreed that an address from the Capital of the province shall be presented at Halifax doubtless by a delegation consisting of His Worship and others. There is something of a consolation in knowing that matters of procedure will not have to be considered by our citizens. An exchange says: "In this connection it may not be out of place to point out that there is already a good deal of comment and criticism of the regulation and ceremonial with which the royal progress is to be hedged about and there is a disposition among many of our contemporaries to scoff at it and rather resent the reception of instruction as to "how the Canadian people are to behave," but a moment's thought should dissipate this view. The public movements of royalty even under our very democratic constitutional sovereignty, are governed by a set of rules as rigid as military regulations. In the Old Country, where they have royalty always with them, this is generally known and understood. By everybody over here it is not and it is simply a case of mugging up the drill for the occasion. His Excellency, the Governor-General, and his staff, are, in a measure responsible for seeing that everything is carried out properly in connection with the visit and in seeing that the necessary information is circulated to ensure this result. His Excellency's Secretary does not originate the regulations, as a good many papers seem to think and instead of criticizing these regulations, Major Maude, would, no doubt, be very much obliged if the press would give him all possible assistance in getting the regulations understood and carried out."

An Autocrat When in His Seat.

(Chicago Record-Herald.)

He is supposed to be impartial, and to protect the rights of the minority, and there is no appeal from his decisions. He is elected at the beginning of each session and can be removed and another substituted in his place at any time by a vote of the House. This has been done on several occasions, but as long as he is in the chair his power is absolute. He can terminate a debate, he can recognize whomsoever he pleases, he can refuse to consider propositions, he can stop a member in the midst of a speech and can do anything which in his judgment, is necessary to promote the business of the nation and the order and discipline of the commons. That is his responsibility, and he exercises it to his best judgment and sense of justice. If he errs he must suffer the penalty but there is none to question or dispute his authority as long as he is in the chair.

With this extraordinary powder the are some drawbacks. The speakers of the House of Commons cannot delegate his authority. He must always be present during the proceedings, and preside, except when the House is in committee of the whole. Then he may retire for the time being, but cannot leave the building. He must always be within call, so that he may resume the chair at a moment's notice. He has magnificent apartments in the Parliament house, which are known as "the speaker's palace"—a suite of between 30 and 40 rooms sumptuously furnished. He receives a salary of \$25,000, and the most of it is required to maintain the expense of his establishment. He pays all his servants and has to entertain a great deal. Theoretically, the palace and the salary he receives are intended for that purpose. When he retires he is usually elevated to the peerage and voted a pension for life.

Life Lost for a Bet—Carnegie's Gift May Be Refused.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO JOIN CANADA.

MONTREAL, August 16.—(Special.)—Newfoundland advises express the opinion that the new Reid contract brings Confederation nearer than before and it is believed to be inevitable in the near future.

NEW YORK, August 16.—(Special.)—Alfred Branco bet a week's pay with his brother that he could stop a switch engine in the yard at Grandon, N. J.

The engineer declined to recognize Branco's signals and the latter remaining on the track in a vain endeavor to win his bet was run over and killed.

To Tunnel to North Pole.

In this year when so many different attempts are being made to reach the Pole, it is interesting to learn the most extraordinary plan yet suggested to accomplish that object. A tunnel in the method proposed by Captain Louis Launette, formerly of the French navy, Captain Launette's idea is that by building a tunnel of closely cemented ice blocks and lightening it with electricity he would establish a route to the Pole perfectly protected from the elements and available for travel at all times, with bases of supply at convenient intervals, in abundance of dogs for traction and constant communication throughout its entire length. He has proposed to travel overland to some point in Alaska, whence a vessel designed for Arctic waters would sail with the expedition to a point already selected by Captain Launette—a point as far north as it is safe to navigate. Thence during the short summer the expedition would be rushed over the border of the region of perpetual ice, where the main base of supplies would be established. Then the ice men and laborers would unpack their tools and set to work at the tunnel road to the North Pole. It is proposed to have an ice floor, ice walls and ice roof.
