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Saga Of Sugar Dan Drawing To Close

SYDNEY, N.S., Aug. 5.—(CP)—The saga of Sugar Dan, out-again in-again convicted thief, seems about to draw to a close. Sentenced to four years for robbery with violence, Daniel J. Morrison, as he is known on police blotters, was refused admittance to Dorchester Penitentiary because he was tubercular. He couldn't be kept in the Cape Breton county jail because it was over-crowded. The city jail agreed to harbor him "for a while." Now, after alternate periods of freedom and confinement, the 39-year-old Latches Creek farmer had been committed to hospital for "a period not exceeding one year." Sugar Dan was shifted from his city jail bunk to St. Joseph's tuberculosis unit at Glace Bay. It is expected he will be sent to the sanatorium in Kentville, N.S., soon.
