De Valera**

**KINGSTON, Aug. 18.**—At the sixteenth annual provincial convention of the Ancient Order of Hibernians today, a resolution to the effect that the Catholic minority in the province may be given the full enjoyment of its educational rights were adopted, and cable sent to De Valera, congratulating him and Dan Brien and the Irish people on the dramatic advance of the Irish cause and pledging one hundred per cent support.

De Valera declared again that the claims of minority in Ireland as represented by the Ulsterites were wrong, but added he for one would be ready a long way to give in to Ulster, "if we could get them to come with us and consider the interest of their own country and not be allying themselves with foreigners."

**Famous Hillside  
Crumbling Away**

**PARIS, Aug. 17.**—Gradually during the past week the Hill of Chignon, near Tours, on which was built one of the most famous mediaeval castles in France, has been mysteriously crumbling away. The steep slopes which have been dried up all summer, have suddenly, at the first rainfall, begun avalanching down into the River Vienne at their foot, and in the rush they have carried down half a dozen houses and are now threatening a whole section of the village with destruction. Last evening two houses collapsed suddenly and four more were so seriously damaged that they had to be evacuated. The earth, too, has today pressed down with such force that a whole street is likely to be engulfed any moment and the people, who have left their houses, can do nothing but stand and watch as the hillside moves inch by inch forward.

All that prevents a calamity is a new wall, built along the face of the cutting in the side of the hill, and this has begun to bulge and crack and may give way at any moment. If it does and the hillside begins sliding at this point, as it has done at others, the town hall and church at Chignon, as well as two score houses, will probably be swept away. The hill is not big, but its steep sides in the flat country like the Loire Valley, made it an easy stronghold in the Middle Ages, and on the crest was built one of the most famous castles of the Kings of France. It was there that Charles Sixth first received Jeanne d'Arc, after the battles between the rival factions were fought during the religious wars on the slopes which are now crumbling away.

**Neguac Tragedy**

**NEWCASTLE, N. B. Aug. 18.**—An emphatic denial by Millett Stewart, that he fired the shots which killed James Ross of Neguac recently and an arrest of four other persons, were the sensational developments in today's tragedy.

At the close of the day's sitting of the Coroner's Court, Fred Tulippe, Joseph Tulippe, John Savoy and Victoria Tulippe were arrested in connection with the shooting of Ross. The prisoners were brought to New Castle and lodged in the County Jail. The arrest of the Tulippes and John Savoy have given a new turn to the Neguac tragedy which created such a sensation.

**Cargo of Parrots**

**NEW YORK, Aug. 17.**—Cries of "Give up a drink" below deck by a chorus of voices sent customs men scurrying down from the deck of the Booth Liner Justice, just arrived in quarantine today, to see whether the ship's bar was open. What they found was a battery of cages filled with parrots. And when the thirsty birds saw the customs men they screamed louder than ever for rum. The vessel arrived today from 800 miles up the Amazon, where 250 of the glib-tongued and gayly apparelled birds were taken aboard. They spoke only Spanish and a few of the languages of the jungle until Second Mate McCabe organized classes in English. Before they got out of the Amazon two of the parrots known as Jack and Jill, were allowed the freedom of the vessel, and it was not discovered until the customs men had left the ship that the birds had hastened a conspiracy. To the delight of the mate they had gone every night at 11:45 o'clock to tell Captain H. Arrow-smith to "call the watch."

That was a joke officers and men alike could enjoy. But after the Justice left quarantine, Jack and Jill stole below and by pecking at the locks of the cages set free 150 of their feathered friends. By the time the vessel reached her berth the deck, masts and bridge were filled with screeching

birds. McCabe insisted they merely wanted to see the Statue of Liberty and study New York's skyline.

"They're struck on the place," he said, "and not a bird has left the ship: They'll all come down at meal time."

**Negro Ran Amuck**

**AUGUSTA, Ga., Aug. 18.**—Five persons are dead as a result of disorders which began when a negro ran amuck this afternoon through the centre of the business section. Seven are known to be wounded, two of them probably fatally.

Patrolman W. W. Moore, an unidentified white man and a negro were killed in a shooting fray following the initial outbreak of the apparently crazed man.

Crowds of armed citizens immediately gathered at the scene of the shooting but were dispersed after some difficulty by the police, who were assisted in their task by a sudden rainstorm. With the cessation of the rain, however, other crowds swiftly collected, and armed bands began to patrol the streets, leading to the fear on the part of the city authorities had not been learned this evening of racial clashes. Details of the other two deaths had not been learned this evening.

Just before 10 o'clock tonight

the police dispersed a mob of several hundred men who gathered about a street car and threatened negroes who were alighting from it.

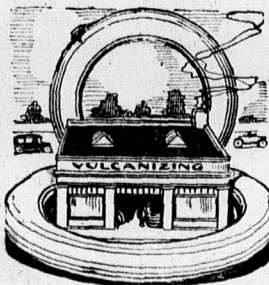
