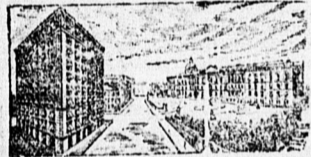

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATION.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions. In certain districts a homestead may be occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader. Duties. Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in certain districts may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead, price \$2.00 per acre. Duties. Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of three years. Must cultivate fifty acres. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties. Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00. W. W. COBBY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. The large circle of friends made during his residence in Vancouver will greatly miss the kindly old man, whose warm and affectionate disposition endeared him to all with whom he came in contact. The funeral service was held on Saturday, Feb. 18, at 2 o'clock, from the residence of Walter H. James, 1636 Napier St., Grandview, thence to St. Michael's church, Mount Pleasant. The interment was made in the Masonic cemetery, of which order the deceased was for many years a faithful member.

SIR WILLIAM MACKENZIE ON NOVA SCOTIA CAR WORKS
