PASTORAL LETTER AMSTERDAM, Feb. 13.—The Cologne Church Gazette publishes a Pastoral letter by Cardinal von Hartmann, Archbishop of Cologne, in which he says: "God has been with our heroic warriors in the west, in the east, on the sea, in the air. He has been with our German people, in whom the determination to hold out and glowing. With God our warriors went into this war, which had been forced upon us, to fight for the existence and to fight for the holy treasures of Christianity and its civilizing influences. Heroic deeds already have been accomplished under God's protection, and under the direction of our glorious leader, the Emperor, and the German Princes."

KAISER WANTED TO MAKE PEACE.

PARIS, Feb. 13.—Certain French newspapers to-day reprint, with the consent of the Government censors, an article published in the Democratic Del Delmont, stating that previous to the battle of the Marne, a party existed in France which was ready to sign a peace, at the same time ceding to Germany the towns of Briey and Nancy, French Lorraine, the island of Madagascar and the Protectorate of Morocco, as well as paying an indemnity. The article continues: "General Joffre, the French Commander-in-Chief, President Raymond Poincare and most of the Cabinet Ministers were opposed to the plan, but the situation became so intense as to necessitate the resignation of Adolphe Messimy, as Minister of War, and the formation of a ministry of National Defence."

After the battle of the Marne, German proposals for peace, through Premier Joseph Caillaux, offering to give up the Provinces of Alsace and Lorraine, with the exception of Strasbourg, receiving in exchange a small zone on the North Sea coast, extended to Calais, Dunkirk, France, in addition, was to acknowledge the annexation of Belgium, by Germany. "The answer to this proposal was the signing of a convention by the Allies, to make no separate peace. After this M. Caillaux was appointed to an important position in the pay corps; but later was relieved of this position and sent on a mission to Brazil."

SCORES WILSON'S ATTITUDE TO KAISER

CALGARY, Feb. 13.—"The ridiculous Gibberish birthday message which President Wilson on behalf of the American people sent to that monster, that incarnation of crime and savagery, the German Emperor, was an intense disappointment to me," said Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, the eminent English actor, who is here. "I believe the great majority of the American people, the thinking, intelligent classes are in hearty sympathy with the cause and ideals of the Allies in this war. Mr. Wilson is actuated by a desire to placate the neutral nations in the population of the United States with a view to its effect upon his reelection."

LINTROSE WILL REPLACE STEAMER EARL GREY

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Feb. 13.—The steel steamer Lintrose, built for the Reid Newfoundland Company in 1913, has been purchased by the Russian government for service as an ice-breaker in the White Sea. The vessel will replace the Canadian Government ice-breaker Earl Grey, which proved inadequate to cope with the severe conditions and is now frozen in Archangel. The Lintrose has sailed for Philadelphia, where it is understood, she will take on supplies and passengers before proceeding to Europe. The Lintrose has been running between Port Aux Basques, at the southwest extremity of Newfoundland and North Sydney, C. B., and has shown herself sufficiently powerful to plough through the ice of Cabot Strait and make nightly trips throughout the winter months. The steamer registers 1,616 tons and is 255 feet long.

RELIEF FOR THE BELGIANS

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—According to the weekly shipping report of the Commission for Relief in Belgium, issued today, the Commission has, to date arranged for a total tonnage of 280,431 tons of food already carried, or to be carried in forty-six ships. The detailed report shows that to date there has been unloaded at Rotterdam 85,180 tons of food from 16 different ships; transported in 16 steamers in transit to Rotterdam 47,000 tons of food, that the Commission has three steamships representing a tonnage of 21,900 tons, now loading in various ports of the United States; eleven ships in transit to American ports, to load 34,300 tons of cargo, seven of which will carry wheat only, and eleven ships representing a tonnage of 63,000 tons on charter for future loading.

SPRING AND SUMMER STYLES FOR MEN.

CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Delegates attending the Convention of the National Association of Merchant Tailors planned to parade down Michigan Avenue in straw hats and summer suits in defiance of an icy wind sweeping from Lake Michigan today to display the newest creations of spring and summer wear for men. More than a thousand tailors are attending the convention. Men styles for the coming season will be as distinctly antimilitaristic as possible, it was announced. There will be no military shoulders or collar effects. The newest figures will be the tendency toward slender and high waisted effects. The coats will be slightly longer, the waist will be high and close fitting, the lapels broad and high, and the shoulders narrow. Very little, if any padding, stuffing or stiffening will be used. The trousers will continue narrow and slightly shorter. Cuffs will be worn on all trousers except evening clothes.

GERMANY WOULD SINK ANY BRITISH SHIP.

LONDON, Feb. 11.—(10.10 p.m.)—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Copenhagen, says: "The New Hamburger Zeitung in an officially inspired article, says the German Admiralty has issued orders that neutral ships shall not be interfered with if they are not suspected of carrying contraband, but that every British ship, whether a war vessel or a merchantman, will be unconditionally sent to the bottom of the sea."
