...NARROW ESCAPE—Impromptu and timely aid was rendered at the Railway Wharf, Wednesday afternoon, when a young gentleman, who was learning to swim, experienced some difficulties and, but for the presence of two spectators, who fortunately possessed some knowledge of lifesaving, the incident might have culminated more seriously.

...TEACHER'S INSTITUTE—A meeting of the Eastern Branch of the Teacher's Institute, was held in Elmira School on Friday evening, August 29th. The meeting, which was largely attended by teachers and rate payers was called to order at 7.30 p.m. The opening address was delivered by Harvey Christopher, President of the Institute, who in a lucid and forcible way, pointed out the greatness of the teacher's calling and how they should uphold that profession in every possible way; and one way to do this was by regular attendance at the meetings of the Institute, which was organized for the betterment and advancement of the teacher. The second speaker, Mr. Archibald McPhee emphasized the necessity of the rate-payer visiting the school; he pointed out the benefits that could be derived from such visits. He said that it was the duty of the teacher to impress upon the parent that the proper place for the child between the ages of six and fifteen years was the school room and it was a serious mistake to detail children at home unless it was absolutely necessary. Mr. Raymond McPhee, the next speaker, delivered a short address in which he laid stress on the fact that teachers should attend and help along the Institute. Mr. M. Harris, Secretary of the Elmira school, then spoke. He welcomed the teachers to Elmira and wished them every success with their meetings. Mr. William McDonald, the next speaker, said that teachers should set the example of regular attendance by attending regularly at Institute meetings. The Secretary, Miss Rose, gave some useful hints regarding attendance of pupils at school. It was the general impression of the meeting that a public meeting addressed by teachers would have the effect of awakening an interest among the rate-payers, causing them to co-operate more with the teachers. With this end in view it was moved, seconded and carried that such a meeting be held on September 12th and that Mr. D. J. Mullin, Inspectors of Public School and others be invited to attend. The meeting then adjourned to meet on Friday September 12th.
