CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Oct. 4 (CP) - Farmer Bill Jones of northern Georgia takes an average of 20 bushels of wheat from a field where he reaped only nine bushels in 1938.

Officials who say phosphates are the key to the vast husbandry improvements in the Tennessee Valley and neighboring states during the last 15 years.

Agriculture experts of the T.V.A. a program of regional development operating in seven central states, decided soon after the authority was set up by Congress in 1933, that phosphorus was the major requirement of the region's soil which was fast losing its fertility.

Today, they claim, the program of agricultural change is well on its way.

They point to Bill Jones as a good example of that change. He reduced his acreage of cotton and corn - the crops which depleted his soil - and increased his hay, wheat and rye output. Where he had allowed his

land to lie bare during winters when the soil was literally washed away by the normally heavy rains, he now grows cover crops such as clover.

At the same time his corn yield has doubled from 16 to 36 bushels an acre; the cotton yield is up from 266 to 412 pounds an acre, oats from 11 to 42 bushels; and rye from five to 10.

What sparked the change? That question was asked by some of the scientists and administrators among the party of 140 from 41 countries including Canada, who recently toured conservation projects in the eastern United States following the United Nations Scientific Conference on the Conservation and Utilization of Resources.

To answer the question, the T.V.A. officials took them to a test-demonstration farm, one of the 15,000 now operating in the valley and in 16 states outside the valley. Since inauguration of T.V.A. there have been a total of 9,000 test-demonstration farms.

The test-demonstration system works this way: A community decides that one of their farmers is the best "test farmer." T.V.A. supplies him with fertilizer if he agrees to use it in an efficient manner and keep records of the effect of the fertilizer on his land.

Farmers learned quickly from the example next door. Fertilizer manufacturers who feared that the T.V.A. supply of almost free fertilizer would hurt their business, were soon placated. The sales of commercial fertilizer soared as the test-demonstration system spread.
