

THE MARKET

MONTREAL, Que., April.—The local and export trade in all lines of grain continued inactive Sunday but values were firm. The price of the market for spring and winter wheat flour was steady but the demand was limited. A fair amount of business was done in all lines of millfeed and values were well maintained. Standard grades of rolled corn were unchanged. Butter continued scarce Saturday and prices we marked up another cent per lb. Receipts were 559 packages. The side in cheese continued of a limited character and values were unchanged. Receipts were 160 boxes. A active business was done in all grades of eggs and the undertone to the market was steady. Receipts were 3,942 boxes. The potato market was active and firm. New Brunswick green mountains sold at 50c for 60 lbs. in bulk. Prince Edward Island, whites at 65c and green mountains at 70c per 90 lbs. in bags. The business was done in beans, prices were firm.

Canadian handpicked sold at \$5.65, prime at \$5.50 and yellow eye at \$4.20 per bushel.

Church Services

FOUNDER'S SUNDAY AT THE SALVATION ARMY CITADEL

The week end services at the Citadel were marked by affectionate remembrance of William Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army. On Saturday evening a bright praise service opened the week's special celebration. Mrs. Adjutant Martin delivered the Holiness Address at the Sunday morning service, taking for her text "For me to live is Christ and to die is gain," and employing two of the Founder's favorite songs, "Lord Through the Blood, Cleansing for Me," his own composition, and "From Every Stain Made Clean," still a favorite to this day.

In the afternoon service the Founder's stirring songs were sung, opening with "We are Marching Onward, Singing as We Go" and "We're Marching to Zion." Adjutant Martin delivered a short address on "The Army Warriors of the Founder's Time" and exhorted present day Salvationists to "War a good warfare." Music was rendered by the Brass Quartette.

A splendid congregation filled the Citadel for the evening service, which opened with the Founder's world famous composition "O, Boundless Salvation," and another favorite "There is a Better World They Say." Adjutant Martin delivered his address from the notes of William Booth's last Sunday night address, delivered at Warrington, England, on April 28th, 1912. The text as follows: "What will you do with Jesus?" Matt. 27:22.

The gist of the address in brief is as follows: After describing the scene of Jesus hailed before Pilate by the High Priests and chief dignitaries of Jerusalem, the address dealt with the cowardice of Pilate, and the demand of the mob for Barrabas. Then the question was asked of the unconverted "What will you do with Jesus?" The speaker exposed several courses common among men: (1) Deny His mission by accusing Him of being an impostor and in league with the Devil. (2) Deny personal need of a Saviour. (3) Openly reject Him. (4) Pretend to accept Him, calling oneself by His name, while the heart is still far from Him. (5) Treat the whole matter with cruel indifference. At this point it was declared that on the day of crucifixion, there were shops open, business and commerce in full swing, feasts and amusements going wild, while the Son of God hung on the Cross. Then the closing appeal was made to accept Jesus whole-heartedly as Blessed Saviour, and for the ungodly to take their stand on His side and attack all the efforts of men to take the other wrong courses referred to.

During the service Mrs. Adj. Martin sang the favorite song of the late Commissioner Lawley, the Founder's faithful A.D.C., "Hark, Hear the Saviour Knocking." The usual prayer meeting was held before the close.

At the close of the evening service the candidates who received the ordinance of baptism in the morning were welcomed into the Church by the right hand of fellowship, after which the Lord's Supper was observed.

Mr. Vincent's very fruitful and effective service with the Church closes for the present, at any rate, with this Sunday's service, and he and Mrs. Vincent leave on Tuesday morning for Sussex, where Mr. Vincent is to assist Rev. Dr. N. A. MacNeill for some weeks. The many friends made by Mr. and Mrs. Vincent will gladly welcome them to Charlottetown if their plans should make it possible to come this way again.

"I" SING SONG

The usual Sunday evening service of the song under the auspices of the Student's Christian Movement of P. W. C. was held in the Y. M. C. A. last evening with an attendance of upwards of 400 young people. The Scripture lesson was read by Mr. Arthur Woolner, and Mr. Elmer Ashley led in prayer. A duet by Mr. Ben Acorn and Mr. C. L. McKay with Mrs. K. S. Rogers as accompanist, also a solo by Mr. Ben Acorn, "Open the Gates" were greatly enjoyed by all.

The speakers for the evening were, Mrs. Foster, General Field Secretary for the Y. W. C. A. in Canada, and also Mr. Homer Norton, of Oxford University, who is at present supplying in the Central Christian Church of this city. Both speakers spoke of the apparent changes in the younger generation and appealed for a seeking after truth and a desire to seek a more vivid understanding of Christ and his relation to our lives.

Miss Nan Shaw was pianist, and Miss Thelma Teed was again present to assist with her violin. Mr. Edwin White presided. The service was closed with prayer by Mr. Norton.

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

At the Wednesday evening Prayer and Fellowship service, Rev. H. Johnson gave a Past-Easter address from John 20:20. "Then were the disciples glad when they saw the

Lord." This was at the first appearance of Jesus to His disciples in the supper room on the evening following His resurrection and so today His presence with us brings joy and gladness.

At the morning service yesterday, gave further consideration to "Christ's resurrection and ours" as expounded by the Apostle Paul in 1 Cor. 15. It is the central doctrine of the Christian religion. It not only includes the immortality of the soul as Plato believed, but the resurrection of the body, a transformed or spiritual body but nevertheless retaining our personal identity. This service was broadcast.

In the evening Rev. Mr. Johnson took as his text John 14:28, "If ye loved me, ye would rejoice because I said I go unto the Father." The scripture lesson was the parable of the Prodigal Son or more properly the wonderful loving Father. The fear or dread of death is a human tendency, but Jesus has taken away the fear. He has taught us that it is "going unto the Father." The great end of life is our right relationship to God.

Notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather there were good congregations at all services and the musical programme included an Anthem at each service and in the evening a solo by Mr. George Johnson. There is genuine sorrow at the passing from our midst of Rev. W. H. Spencer, who was greatly beloved and who assisted in the pre-Easter services with much acceptance. A large number attended the funeral services in the Church on Saturday afternoon. There was also a good representation of Ministers from our Presbytery.
