UNITED DAUGHTERS OF CONFEDERACY

NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 11.—The annual general convention of the United Daughters of the Confederacy was called to order here this morning by Mrs. Alexander White, of Paris, Tenn., the president of the organization, and the attending members, several hundred in number, were welcomed by the Mayor and other speakers in behalf of the city. The program of the gathering, arranged by the local chapters of the organization is quite interesting and elaborate and includes many pleasing social and entertainment features. The Grunewald Hotel is the headquarters of the convention and there the sessions will be held. One of the interesting features will be the consideration of a proposition by Mrs. W. D. Lamar, State President of the Georgia branch of the organization, to pass resolutions condemning "The Southerner" by Walter H. Page, American ambassador to England, upon the ground that the book unjustly reflected upon the people of the South. At the close of the convention the members will make a pleasure trip to the Panama Canal in the palatial 6000-ton steamship Abagail of the United Fruit Company's "great white fleet," which will sail from this port on Nov. 16.

The United Daughters of the Confederacy was organized at Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 10, 1894, and has now 1,380 chapters in North America and Mexico, with an aggregate of more than 80,000 members.

NINA VAN ZANDT AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT

CHICAGO, Nov. 11.—Twenty-six years ago today August Spies, and three other anarchists who have been found guilty of having caused the famous Haymarket riot, were executed by hanging in the Cook County jail and by a strange coincidence Nina Van Zandt, who occupied so prominent a position during the closing hours of the Haymarket tragedy, by marrying August Spies, is again in the limelight. This time, as court planning for a divorce suit against her third husband, Gregory Salamo, the owner of a cafe in South Halsted Street.

The life of Nina Van Zandt, or Mrs. Nina Van Zandt-Spies-Malato-Salamo, as she was in the habit of calling herself, was decidedly out of the ordinary and replete with sensational incidents. She was the daughter of one of the wealthiest and most exclusive families of Pittsburgh, Pa. She was handsome and talented, even brilliant and her parents spoiled her and spoiled her by indulging every one of her whims and wishes. She graduated from Vassar and was considered a brilliant scholar and accomplished linguist. She was on a visit in Chicago when Spies and the other anarchists were tried and while attending the trial as a spectator, she fell in love with Spies. In her impulsive way she made no secret of her feelings for the prisoner. She showered him with flowers and candy, supplied him with books and delicacies and frequently visited him in prison. It was Nina who proposed to Spies, but at first he declined to link her fate to his while his very life was at stake.

But Nina insisted and finally Spies, who took a more matter-of-fact view of the situation, consented. As Sheriff Matson would not permit the ceremony to take place in the jail, a proxy marriage was arranged, in which Louis Spies, a brother of August Spies, represented the bridegroom. On November 11, 1887, Spies was executed and Nina donned a widow's garb, which was becoming to her style of beauty. For several years little was seen or heard of her. She travelled in Europe and seemed to enjoy life in spite of her bereavement.

In 1895 she was married to Stephen Malato, now assistant state's attorney, who was then extremely youthful and unsophisticated. The marriage attracted scarcely any interest at the time, but in 1906 Mrs. Malato once more came into the limelight by filing a suit for divorce against her husband, accusing him of infidelity and with "various other misdeeds, including 'corruption' in buying the votes of Italian voters in the neighborhood of Milwaukee Avenue and Halsted street. She was granted her divorce in 1907 and a year or so later she married Gregory Salamo. From the declaration in her divorce suit filed a few days ago, it appears that the third marriage was even less happy than her former marriages. She claimed that Salamo treated her with "great cruelty" and forced her to leave him to earn her own living.

CHANGES MADE

IN BISLEY RULES.

LONDON, Nov. 10.—Col. Cross, of the National Rifle Association, states that Colonel Ward, of the War Office, has accepted membership in the council of the N.R.A. In view of persistent rumors of friction existing between the War office and the N.R.A., which was likely to effect the future of Bisley meets, the announcement will be particularly pleasing to Bisley votaries in Canada. Colonel Cross also announces that the next Bisley meeting has been fixed to open July 13, and that the following new regulations as to sighting shots have been made:

Shots before individual competitions in which each shot is separately signalled, and which is not shot shoulder to shoulder, one compulsory non-convertible sighting shot shall be taken.

There is to be no sighting shot before "A" competitions in which each shot is not separately signalled; "B" team competitions; "C" before its shooting and "D" before shoulder to shoulder shooting.

In match rifle competitions the target will have a centre 24 inches in diameter to be marked with "V", which will count 64 in the service rifle competitions.

Bull's eye at 500 yards will be reduced from 18 inches diameter to 16 inches.

The council have decided to send a British rifle team to Australia next year, and have appointed Colonel Barlow commander and J. P. Somers shooting captain.

ROME, Nov. 11.—Throughout the whole of Italy the 44th anniversary of the King's birth was celebrated today by the people who are extremely fond and proud of their small but energetic King.
