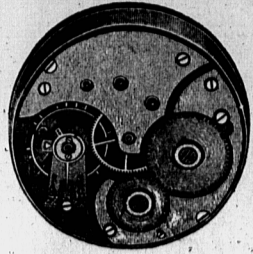

POWER TRIAL FOR MURDER.

The Power trial was resumed yesterday morning. There was a fair attendance at Court, but no deep interest in the proceedings. There was no important new evidence.

Dr. McNeill testified to the wounds on the body and was of the opinion that some method was made a sharper instrument than the axe, probably a knife. This was more apparent in the cuts through the coat. Any one of a number of blows would suddenly stop the heart.

Dr. McLaughlin also described wounds and thought all might have been caused by the axe which was sharper at one end of the blade than the other, or by falling on the sidewalk. He thought it was probable that wounds might be inflicted by a person without receiving any blood.

Patrick Keenan had met Michael Power, Sr. and Jr. with L. Hennessey and B. King returning from Hennessey's. They went into the house and he went in also at Michael, Sr.'s request. They talked about sending the boy to the Asylum and Keenan suggested that he be arrested and have the police take him there. Keenan then notified the Marshall.

Witness was in the house previous about 8 p. m. Art Duse came in and told about the murder. Palmer came later and said he saw some one with long boots on running away from Connolly's warehouse.

The murder was talked about at Michael, Jr. sat with his head in his hands apparently taking no notice of what was going on. Prisoner had on black hat and blue coat. Dry mud was on one of the sleeves of his coat and he thought it belonged to one of his brothers.

Thomas Beron, the owner of the house, testified as to the position of his yard, when the axe was taken, and the street. He explained hearing about the murder, missing the axe and finding it at the Police Station.

Court then adjourned till 2.30. The Court met again at half-past two.

Lawrence Hennessey testified that Michael Power, Sr., and Michael Power, Jr., had come to his mother's house corner Cornwall and Sydney Sts., between 8.30 and nine o'clock. Nothing was said about the murder. He later went down to the Powers accompanied by Michael, Sr., and the son. After a time the officers came and arrested Michael, Jr. There was no talk about the murder afterwards. He thought Power was arrested on an old complaint of assaulting the officers some years ago. There was no talk about the murder that evening in fact he didn't hear of it until next morning. He and Brad King followed the officers to the station and then returned directly to Power's, not speaking to anyone going or returning.

This concluded the evidence for the day and the prisoner was returned for a week in order that Miss Maggie Robinson a material witness could be obtained.

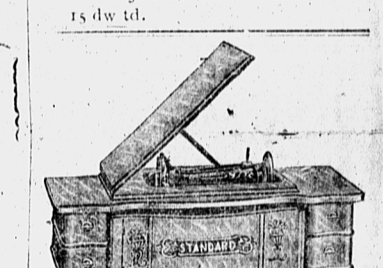
