Freedom and Activity Men's Advantage, Is Public View

TORONTO, Aug. 14 - What few men would like to be women think that they would thereby escape responsibilities.



How varying viewpoints influence attitudes on this traditional question is revealed in the typical reasons given by members of each sex for desiring to be the opposite, or the same.

Men prefer to be men because: "A man has more privileges." "Larger professional field; more active life." "Prefer responsibility to being dependent." "A man asks for what he wants; a woman waits to be asked." Women would prefer to be men because: "Men have more opportunities and adventures." "A man has both a career and marriage." "They haven't as many aches and pains as women." (Some men would prefer to be women because: "She gets paid for it." "Haven't the responsibilities men have." "During the war she has shown herself wonderful.") Women prefer to be women because: "A man has too many responsibilities and has to work harder." "A woman has as many rights as a man." "I like being looked after." "It's like a baby in your arms is wonderful." "The feeling of a man looking after me and working for me." "It is significant that the desire of women to be men is usually associated with career interests and the view that the male is the dynamic sex." Most men and women, however, revealed that they are happy as they are, thanks to the other sex. Typical are the woman who explained, "I like the way a man looks after me and works for me," and the man who likes being a man because he has "been able to have a nice wife."
