The Military Concert.

There was a military air about all that pertained to the grand concert last evening. The program was embellished with the faces of Lord Roberts and the officers and members of the Island Contingent, and best of all the Boys in Khaki were there and everybody there to see and hear them. The Fourth Regiment Band discoursed rare music; the songs, recitations and scenes all had a martial flavor; and the battle smoke permeated the hall in a manner apparent both to eyes and nose—perhaps also a little trying to the vocalists. The scenes from the war were intensely realistic, the first one, in the trenches before Paardeberg, almost painfully so. Together they helped the auditory to realise a little of what real war had meant in the year past to our brave boys.

Rev. Mr. Fullerton received a distinct ovation as he appeared, and frequent applause as he praised the Island Boys, and promised to tell more about them on a future occasion. As for the concert there were many well known participants. Mr. Brent McInnis sang with spirit, 'The Girl Behind the Man Behind the Gun'; Master Warburton danced the Fisher's Hornpipe with spangly grace; Miss Cotton has seldom if ever sang better than in that sad sweet song of 'Babette and Pierrot'; Rev. Leo Williams read the Wounded Soldier with rare expression and pathos; Prof. Harry Watts displayed his complete mastery of the clarinet; Prof. Tanton re-appearing after years of absence, and in excellent voice sang 'Soldier Laddie'.

In opening the second part of the entertainment the ladies of the St Cecilia Club charmed the eye and ear with their deft fingering of banjo and mandolin; Miss LeFurgey aroused great enthusiasm with a patriotic recitation; Miss Florence Farle always a favorite, called forth hearty applause as she sang 'The Boggy'; Mr. Charles Earle's song, 'For the Colors', was unsurpassed by any vocal effort of the evening; Prof. Vinnicombe called forth a storm of applause in his violin solo; Mrs. Watts sang with rare grace and expression a selection from 'Samson and Delilah'; and Mr. Ed. Mitchell elicited merry shouts by his 'Coon Song', in character. There were no encores permitted, and the rule was necessary; otherwise all the vocalists, instrumental performers, and elocutionists would have been recalled. The National Anthem closed the excellent program at a late hour.
