## IN MEMORIAM

MRS. HAROLD L. SMITH.

At Vancouver, B. C., on February 4th, 1919, Hazel Pauline Milliken, beloved wife of Harold L. Smith passed away after a few days illness of influenza aged twenty-four years. The late Mrs. Smith was an undergraduate nurse, having trained in the P. E. I. Hospital for about two years, but not being in very robust health she did not complete her term. Of a particularly sweet and amiable disposition, in whatever capacity she was called to serve, her gentle manner, her loving ministrations, and the unselfishness of her life, could not but call forth the deepest love and admiration, of those whose lives touched hers.

She was called home, it is true, in the morning of life, but say not that such a life has been lived in vain; its memory and influence, must ever enrich the heart experience of those who are left to mourn, and into their lives, must come, even through sadness, the blessed hope of reunion, in that fuller life beyond death's shadows. Her dying hours were made beautiful, by her steadfast trust in her Saviour, and after requesting her nurse to sing—"Rock of Ages," she sweetly fell asleep. ## SERVICE CROSS TO MISS MACDONALD

A Washington Exchange says:—The first woman to win the American Army's Distinguished Service Cross is Miss Beatrice MacDonald of the Reserve Nurse Corps, who was seriously wounded while remaining at her post with wounded men at a British casualty station during a German night raid.

Sec. Baker invited her to the War Department today to receive the decoration with formal ceremonies.

In presenting the decoration to Miss MacDonald, Sec. Baker asserted it gave him great pleasure "to say that the Army of the United States is under deep obligation to the nurses who served so gallantly and so faithfully; that our losses in this war were so slight, relatively, is undoubtedly due to the fidelity, self-sacrifice and heroism of the women of the nurse corps who ministered to our wounded at the very front."

Miss MacDonald's home is in New York city. Her citation follows: "Miss Beatrice MacDonald, reserve nurse, Army Nurse Corps, for extraordinary heroism while on duty with the surgical team at the British casualty clearing station No. 61, British area. During a German night air raid she continued at her post of duty, caring for the sick and wounded until seriously wounded by a German bomb, thereby losing one eye."

At the same time, the Distinguished Service Cross was awarded to H. H. Adams, director of inland traffic "for exceptionally meritorious and conspicuous service with the Army of the United States," and to nine officers of the Allied armies who have rendered service in Washington in the coordination of military effort. They are:

Maj. Gen. Kasatsugu Inouye, Japanese military attache in Washington, and Capt. Hisao Watari, assistant military attache at the Japanese Embassy; Lieut. Philip Barber, acting military attache at the Belgian Legation; Capt. Count Enrico Luserna di Campiglione, liaison officer between the Italian Embassy and the Italian High Commission and the War Department; Col. Louis Remand, chief of the French Military Mission; Lieut. Col. Edouard J. Requin, special delegate of the French General Staff and personal representative of Marshal Joffre and Marshal Foch; Maj. Leopold Pierre de Montal, liaison officer between the French Embassy and High Commission and the War Department; Lieut. Col. H. Arthur Pakenham, C. K. G., British General Staff, liaison officer between the British and American Military Intelligence Service; Maj. Walter Miller, Canadian forces, liaison officer between the British Embassy and the Canadian Ministry of Militia and Defense and the War Department.

The three French officers were not present, having been called home, but their decorations will be presented to them by Gen. Pershing in France.

The Miss Beatrice MacDonald spoken of here is a daughter of D. H. MacDonald, North Bedouque, near Summerside.

## HERO WELCOMED.

Pte. H. P. Bradley, son of Patrick Bradley, St. Teresas, arrived at his home on Wednesday, March, the 6th, after spending three weeks and ten months on the blood-stained fields of Flanders. He enlisted in the 55th Battalion, N. B., and left as a draft June the 10th, 1915, and arrived in England on the 27th of June, 1915, and afterwards transferred to the 14th Battalion in France. He served for eleven months, was in the battle of Ypres, where he was wounded in a sacrifice attack. Came back to Blithy and was convalescent for over a year. He went back to France after the Great British retreat, and received three wounds at the battle of Arras. He was in one of the greatest gains the Canadians ever made and wears the 1915 star. He met his brothers, Cpl. L. Bradley at Ypres. Pte. Bradley is 26 years of age and looks good, and enjoying the best of health after his long military career. He was accompanied by a hero from Mt. Stewart, Pte. Reggie Walsh, who left Canada the same year to fight for King and country. Pte. Bradley received a hearty welcome from his friends and relatives.
