Well Attended Meeting Of A.R.P. Workers Held

Last night an enthusiastic and well attended meeting of the various A. R. P. Auxiliary services, Ward Captains, and other members of the Charlottetown Civilian Defense services was held in the City Council chambers.

The purpose of the meeting was to review the set up of the various auxiliary services and define their particular relationships.

Dr. J. A. MacMillan reviewed the Medical Auxiliary service. He stressed the necessity of reporting all casualties accurately to the auxiliary controllers.

He emphasized that it was the duty of the wardens to keep all traffic lanes cleared for ambulances and first aid crews.

Fire Chief Angus McEachern reviewed the functions of the auxiliary fire services, and Mr. H. A. Messervey, Controller of Transportation, dealt with that particular aspect of the work and Mr. J. E. Sterne, Controller of Police and Special Constables reviewed the work of his department.

Mr. R. C. Charrier, liaison officer between the Charlottetown Civilian Defense Committee and the Provincial A. R. P. and Major W. H. Poole, a representative from the latter organization, were present and clarified many points on which there might be confusion or overlapping.

Chief of Police Birliwale was also present and took part in the discussions.

All the speakers referred to the importance of the work and the Warden's. It is the intention to hold Warden's meetings in the various wards to discuss A. R. P. relationships.

Mr. J. A. Fullerton acted as chairman last night in the absence of the supervisor, Mayor B. Roy Holman.

bell Government collected \$2,077,000 or more than the amount.

In motor vehicle revenue the Conservatives collected in three years \$318,000, or an average per year of \$106,000.

The amount of taxes the Campbells collected in 1937, 1938 and 1939 was \$1,027,000, an average of \$342,666 per year.

In other words they obtained \$708,000 more for motor vehicle revenue than the Conservatives plus a million and a half dollars more in gasoline tax.

In annual income the Conservatives collected \$25,000; the Liberals in seven years, \$104,000.

Prohibition Act

Citing Prohibition Act administration, Dr. MacMillan said the fact that the Liberals find it necessary to come to the Legislature at the present time, is a direct reflection on the public disaffection with the administration.

He cited revenues under the Prohibition Act from the years 1931 to 1942 inclusive. The Liberals in seven years collected \$1,027,000, an average of \$146,714 per year.

In other words they obtained \$708,000 more for motor vehicle revenue than the Conservatives plus a million and a half dollars more in gasoline tax.

Huge Revenue Increase

"Altogether they had a revenue of four and a quarter million dollars more than we had," said Dr. MacMillan. "Despite this, they came out with the following increased revenue: From Aug. 15 to Dec. 31, 1935, \$343,000; 1936, \$215,522; 1937, \$1,244,000; 1938, \$1,768,924."

Falconwood Costs

Falconwood hospital expenditures, Dr. MacMillan said, is the best yardstick for measuring economies under various governments. He went back to 1920, showing that the yearly average expenditure of the Bell Government was about \$117,000. During Conservative years 1924-27 the average expenditure was kept down to \$105,000. In the following years, 1928-30 it rose to \$116,000. The Conservative average during the succeeding years, 1931-39, was \$87,000. Expected for the year 1940 is \$1,100,000 and for 1941, \$1,200,000."

At 6 o'clock Dr. MacMillan moved adjournment of the debate, and the House adjourned until 11 a.m. today.

A Wonderful Instrument

"In view of the fact that our act is supposed to be for the curbing of liquor, it would be interesting to know how the government got its liquor sales stabilized from the Dominion Government this year. It is supposed that they went to the Dominion and complained that the Dominion was interfering with our sale of liquor. It is supposed to prohibit, but it is a government sale act. It is not controlling, it is expanding. It was far better administered to my mind in the days when there was a Commission, and I think that is the way it should be administered today."

Succession duties, Average under Conservatives \$39,900. Under Liberals, \$48,800.

Dr. MacMillan commended an address delivered by Prof. W. J. Reid before the Rotary Club, stressing the farm labor shortage question. He added that it is vitally important that this problem be solved. We must have more young men to do the work on Island farms. If every Province sent from 10 to 11 per cent of its people into the service forces, as Prince Edward Island has done, they would have enough men in the army without requiring to call up more.

He cited the problem of the warble fly, as one calling for the attention of the Department of Agriculture.

Dr. MacMillan was pleased that the Government made no attempt this year, as they did last, to cut out the exhibit in the Fisheries. He had had to replace it in the estimates at the request of the Opposition.
