**BRAVE VOLUNTEERS.**

When the first Canadian Regiment for South Africa was enlisted, and so many of our Island boys were eager to go, it was said with a measure of truth that they had little idea of the dangers and hardships they would be called to endure. Some persons even thought that when once confronted with the enemy they would wish themselves safe at home again. How erroneous this impression was has been proven by the letters they have sent home, and above all by the admirable conduct and the heroism they have displayed since they landed in South Africa. We have yet to hear or to read the first word of regret. Much less have we to hear or to read the first intimation that any Canadian has shown "the white feather" or become panic-stricken in presence of the enemy. Our men have proved themselves in every way worthy to stand side by side with the best and the bravest soldiers of the Queen.

When the Second Contingent was enlisted in Canada many brave young Islanders were eager to go, although in the meantime the deadly character of the war had been revealed in a series of reverses and losses. There was keen disappointment that only one or two from the Island could be permitted to go, because this Contingent had gathered sufficient numbers in the west. Now that a sudden call has been made for fifteen men from the Island to replace the losses in the field, the full number and more have offered themselves and have been enrolled within a few hours of the first intimation of the call. It cannot be said of these brave young that they go forth without a knowledge of what is before them. They have read of the deadly rifle fire of the unseen enemy, of the barbed wire traps, of the destruction wrought by shot and shell, and of the deadly ravages of disease. They know of brave Canadians killed and wounded and have seen the flags at half mast telling of Island comrades who have fallen on the battlefield. Their innate courage and love of country still prompt them to go, and the dangers of the field are but a lure to their brave, adventurous spirits. Brave volunteers! We are all proud of them.

The redistribution bill has again passed the House of Commons, the division list showing a Government majority of forty six, including all the independents. Even Mr. Puttee, the newly elected member for Winnipeg, who had been claimed by the Opposition, voted with the Ministerial majority. The bill has been somewhat modified from that of last year, a notable alteration being that the peculiar constituencies of St. John City, and St. St. John City and County are left unchanged. The bill will now go to the Senate where its fate will be uncertain. Last year the Senate rejected it, but there are more Liberals in that House now, and some of the Conservative Senators may have in the meantime decided not to longer resist the pronounced desire of the popular Chamber.
